## March 28, 2021

In case you don't know him or haven't met him, Mr. Jose Adan Bernabe is our deacon in training and will be ordained a permanent deacon for our parish on May 8<sup>th</sup>! Jose was part of the Spanish community at St. Cornelius and he and his wife Marcela discerned the call from God that he was meant to be a deacon. He currently primarily assists at the Spanish Mass and with the Spanish community, but he will be involved with the whole parish going forward. He doesn't give himself credit for how good his English is getting. Jose will be doing readings during the Triduum so you will get a chance to meet him if you haven't, and be sure to pray for him and thank him for saying yes to God's call.

Thank you for all those who donated for the tabernacle, ciborium, and two chalices that are being restored. We've raised enough money now for those specific items, over \$8,500 was collected, praise God! I'll take pictures and show you the beautiful results of your sacrifice as soon as they're ready. Of course, you'll see them in use at the church right away as well.

As I write this, we have reason to believe from the Cardinal that the Covid restrictions on Mass attendance will be relaxed a bit, we will have found out by Friday, March 26<sup>th</sup>. Whatever the changes are will be announced by this weekend's Masses and should make our Holy Week and Easter Masses/services more accommodating. We will let you know once we find out.


This weekend is Palm Sunday and we will have the palms already blessed by the time you get to church. The change during the Mass is quite astounding, we go from acclaiming Jesus as the Son of David and then we are crying out with the crowds "crucify Him."

It is shocking to consider that Jesus was so widely hailed by the crowds on His entry into Jerusalem but then was rejected or abandoned by all but a few of His most faithful followers. For us this can serve as a real gut check about our own fidelity to the Lord.

Some, like Peter and the other disciples abandoned the Lord out of fear. Pilate also gave in to fear before the angry crowds and the Sanhedrin who demanded Christ's death. Even Joseph of Arimithea who offered his family tomb for the Lord after His death is not reported as speaking up on Jesus' behalf before the Sanhedrin. Fear explains why so many people who believed in Jesus were not there with Him at the end. St. Peter who said at the Last Supper, *"Even though I should have to die with you, I will not deny you"* denied the Lord three times out of fear. How would we have responded if we were there? How do we respond now?

The only sin God can't forgive though, is the one we're not sorry for. No matter if we have betrayed Christ like Judas or denied Him like Peter the key is to receive His mercy and not despair. In the end, we are all responsible for the Lord having to come to us as a suffering redeemer, we're all responsible for Christ's Passion because of our sins. If we receive His mercy and forgiveness though, we can be like the faithful women, the Virgin Mary and St. John.

I've been meaning to offer something for some time now. This year, on Divine Mercy Sunday, I will lead the Chaplet and a brief reflection on Divine Mercy Sunday (April 11, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of Easter) at 3:00 pm. Jesus Christ loves us, knows our sins, and wants us to trust His love and mercy more than we look at our own, or other's faults. "Jesus, I trust in you."

Snake Charming, and the Christmas Altar Bells are Ringing

Today begins Holy Week. There is much to say, and little space, so I will focus on just one aspect of the Triduum. On Holy Thursday, during the Gloria, you will hear bells being rung. After that moment, there are no bells or instruments again until the Gloria at the Easter Vigil (See Roman Missal Holy Thursday Rubric #7). Why ring bells? Well, there are many reasons. The bells are a joyous sound - traditionally church bells have been rung to commemorate celebratory moments (think weddings, ending of wars, etc.). Bells are also associated

with protection from the demonic. They are tolled after a funeral as a final send off to help the departed on their final journey. Altar bells are used at various points during the Mass to call attention to important events about to occur, and to add beauty. Exorcists routinely use bells for all these reasons; demons really do not like things that call our minds to God, and bells do just that (very loudly and unapologetically). We even baptize bells (it is not the same kind of baptism that we get, it is actually an elaborate blessing, but the nickname has stuck).

The bells are rung during these two Glorias (and no others during the year) because we are "book-ending" a critically important event. In between Holy Thursday and the Easter Vigil we commemorate the institution of the Eucharist, the

death and resurrection of the Lord - just as we do at every consecration - and as at the consecration, we call to mind its importance, in part, through the use of bells. While the bells are silent, we use either a crotalus or a "tric troc" (wooden clapper). These instruments are not festive at all, they have a hard and clipped sound (think opposite of ringing), which is fitting for the Triduum. They also call to mind the sound of rattlesnakes (symbolic of evil) and reference Mark 16:18, where Christ says those who are baptized will handle snakes barehanded and be unharmed by poison. Their use alludes to Christ's triumph, even through death.

Everything about the Mass, even down to the minute details of what instruments are used, how they are used, and when they are used, has deep symbolic meaning. I hope you consider joining us to experience the entire Triduum this year.

## **DEACON ORDINATION OF JOSE ADAN BERNABE**

Mr. José Adan Bernabé, a member of our parish, is a candidate for the Permanent Diaconate. Bishops, priests, and deacons receive the Sacrament of Holy Orders. The diaconate is a three-fold ministry of Word, Liturgy and Charity/Social Justice. Deacons are ordained to baptize, proclaim the Gospel and preach, assist at the Eucharist, witness marriages, and officiate at wakes and funeral services. These are the functions most visible in the parish. The diaconal ministry has its history in the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 6. The Apostles laid hands on seven reputable men, filled with the Holy Spirit and wisdom to care for the widows and take care of the daily distribution of food in the early Christian community.

The ministry most characteristic of the deacon centers on caring for the poor, the alienated, and those who, for various reasons, find themselves on the fringe of society. Deacon's minister in hospitals, prisons, among people with AIDS, in shelters and soup kitchens, and within the various ministries coordinated through organizations such as Catholic Charities and the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Especially in the workplace, deacons are visible signs of Christ the Servant in the community.

Part of the process toward ordination is to announce to the community about this person's intentions to be ordained, and make sure that the community assures that this person possesses the qualities to be an ordained minister. If anyone who knows any reason why this candidate should not be ordained is bound to disclose this immediately. Please contact your pastor or call the office of formation at 847.837.4557 as soon as possible.

If there is no objection from the parish community, Mr. José Adan Bernabé will be ordained permanent deacon in one of the two celebrations we will have on May 8, 2021 at Holy Name Cathedral.

Please keep *José Adan Bernabé*, and his wife *Marcela Adan Bernabé*, all those who will be ordained, those in formation and their families, in your prayers that they might continue to answer God's call in their lives.

## A Papal Encyclical On Fraternity and Social Friendship (Fratelli Tutti) – Part VII

This is the last of a series of excerpts from Pope Francis' recent Encyclical Fratelli Tutti. I think that there are many worthy ideas for us to reflect on and to

act on. Doing spiritual reading is certainly one of the prominent aspects of Lent. I'd like to suggest that you use these excerpts as a starting point. The entire Encyclical can be found online.

285. In my fraternal meeting, which I gladly recall, with the Grand Imam Ahmad Al-Tayyeb, "we resolutely [declared] that religions must never incite war, hateful attitudes, hostility and extremism, nor must they incite violence or the shedding of blood. These tragic realities are the consequence of a deviation from religious teachings. They result from a political manipulation of religions and from interpretations made by religious groups who, in the course of history, have taken advantage of the power of religious sentiment in the hearts of men and women... God, the Almighty, has no need to be defended by anyone and does not want his name to be used to terrorize people". For this reason I would like to reiterate here the appeal for peace, justice and fraternity that we made together:

"In the name of God, who has created all human beings equal in rights, duties and dignity, and who has called them to live together as brothers and sisters, to fill the earth and make known the values of goodness, love and peace;

"In the name of innocent human life that God has forbidden to kill, affirming that whoever kills a person is like one who kills the whole of humanity, and that whoever saves a person is like one who saves the whole of humanity;

"In the name of the poor, the destitute, the marginalized and those most in need, whom God has commanded us to help as a duty required of all persons, especially the wealthy and those of means;

"In the name of orphans, widows, refugees and those exiled from their homes and their countries; in the name of all victims of wars, persecution and injustice; in the name of the weak, those who live in fear, prisoners of war and those tortured in any part of the world, without distinction;

"In the name of peoples who have lost their security, peace and the possibility of living together, becoming victims of destruction, calamity and war;

"In the name of human fraternity, that embraces all human beings, unites them and renders them equal;

"In the name of this fraternity torn apart by policies of extremism and division, by systems of unrestrained profit or by hateful ideological tendencies that manipulate the actions and the future of men and women;

"In the name of freedom, that God has given to all human beings, creating them free and setting them apart by this gift;

"In the name of justice and mercy, the foundations of prosperity and the cornerstone of faith;

"In the name of all persons of goodwill present in every part of the world;

"In the name of God and of everything stated thus far, [we] declare the adoption of a culture of dialogue as the path; mutual cooperation as the code of conduct; reciprocal understanding as the method and standard".

Lord, Father of our human family, you created all human beings equal in dignity:

pour forth into our hearts a fraternal spirit and inspire in us a dream of renewed encounter, dialogue, justice and peace.

Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world,

a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war.

May our hearts be open to all the peoples and nations of the earth.

May we recognize the goodness and beauty that you have sown in each of us,

and thus forge bonds of unity, common projects, and shared dreams. Amen.


