

St. Elizabeth of the Trinity, Tray for Us FEAST DAY - NOVEMBER 8

FROM THE PASTOR...

November 7, 2021

This weekend is special for the parish for a number of reasons. First, Monday, November 8th, is the Memorial of St. Elizabeth of the Trinity. Since she is our patron saint, we are allowed to celebrate the feast day this weekend. Our guest speaker on St. Elizabeth had to reschedule and won't be here until the second weekend of December, but the music, prayers, preaching, and vestments will reflect the memorial of St. Elizabeth of the Trinity.

Also, our 7th and 8th grade RE and school students are preparing for confirmation and will be attending a virtual Holy Fire retreat this weekend. Please pray for the presenters, and our confirmands and their families. We need the power of the Holy Spirit in these times, especially with the gifts of Piety, Fear of the Lord, and Fortitude. Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom and helps us to enter into the necessary life of prayer (piety) where we rely on the Lord's love, grace, and guidance to sustain us on our pilgrim journey. Once we are formed in our Catholic faith, Christ calls us to have courage in living it in the world. Being faithful Catholic disciples of Christ is as unpopular now as it was in the early Church.

This weekend the readings focus on the generosity of two widows. The prophets often reminded their readers not to take advantage of orphans and widows. They represent the most vulnerable of people who have lost husband or parents and our first instinct should be to help such a person in whatever way we could.

In the first reading the prophet Elijah visits the pagan city of Zarephath which is experiencing a severe drought. The widow is there gathering sticks for a fire to have her final meal with her son before they die of hunger. So here we have one of the most vulnerable people in an almost impossible situation and the prophet of God comes. The rock bottom moments are usually when we're most open to God's grace. But what is shocking is how the prophet Elijah speaks to this widow.

First, he asks her for a drink of water which she provides and then he asks her for a bit of bread. Then she tells him her sad story about making the last meal for her and her son and then dying. The prophet says, "don't be afraid, go do as you said...but first bring me a little cake...then you can make something for you and your son." God wanted her to do His will, to put Him first and then all would work out and she and her son were taken care of.

Something similar happened in the Gospel. The Lord praised a woman who had given everything she had to God. Humanly speaking, when we see people in such dire need like these poor widows, we're supposed to help them of course. But when the Lord looks upon us, rich and poor alike, He says things like: "Seek first the kingdom of God...man does not live by bread alone but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." Or when Jesus says: "Doing my Father's will is the food that sustains me."

God doesn't want our money or any of our things. He made them all and truly owns them. The two widow's offerings were praiseworthy because their very lives depended on the gift they gave sacrificially. "For it is love that I desire, not sacrifice, and knowledge of my ways rather than holocausts" (Hos 6:6). It's a Christ-like sacrifice where Jesus literally gives Himself in the offering. But note, it all works out in the end. The first widow was provided for and that's implied for the

second, and Jesus Christ rose from the dead on the third day. That's why Elijah said "don't be afraid" because God cannot be outdone in generosity, so may we give of ourselves.

"Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury."

MARK 12:43

In today's Gospel Jesus tells us: "I want you to observe that this poor widow contributed more than all the others who donated to the treasury. They gave from their surplus wealth, but she gave from her want, all that she had to live on."

Ask yourself "Am I only giving from my surplus wealth?" and then put your gift in the Society of St. Vincent de Paul poor box so that those who are suffering will be able to know God's love and care.

The two university and two high school student scholarships remain in place thanks to their sponsors and the students are performing well.



St. Elizabeth of the Trinity

When she was a young child, St. Elizabeth was very spirited and strong willed. One Advent, unbeknownst to her, the parish priest had borrowed her doll to use as Baby Jesus in the church nativity. While at Mass, Elizabeth saw the doll and shouted, "Bad priest! Bad priest! That's my doll!" much to the embarrassment of her parents.

As she grew up, she never lost that spirit and determination, but used them to help her follow the plan God had for her life. She was determined to join the Carmelites, but her mother had other plans for Elizabeth. In an effort to change her mind, her mother sent her to parties with the hope of Elizabeth meeting a nice young man who would pursue her. When her mother

realized marriage was not the vocation to which God was calling Elizabeth, she relented and gave her permission to join the Carmelite convent where she took the name Elizabeth of the Trinity because of her devotion to the Holy Trinity.

At the age of 23, Elizabeth contracted Addison's disease. Though she suffered greatly from the disease, Elizabeth continued to be joyful because of her relationship with God. Through her example, we can learn that our sufferings, both great and small, help us to unite ourselves more closely with God.

ST. ELIZABETH OF THE TRINITY

Born in France on July 18, 1880

Died in France on November 9, 1906

As a youth she was described as having a terrible temper. After hearing her first Confession the priest told her that she was destined to become either a demon or a saint.

She made her First Communion at the age of 11 and from that point forward she became more even-tempered and increased in her desire for holiness.

Referring to her First Communion she said: "...That day, when Jesus made His dwelling within me, when God took

poccesion of my heart I have aspired only to give my life, to return a little of His great love to the Beloved of the Eucharist who rests in my poor heart."

She entered the Carmelite order of nuns at the age of 21. She would have gone earlier, but her mother wouldn't let her go earlier.

The night before she went to Carmel she said to her mother: "Darling mother, how can I resist the voice of God calling me? He is holding out His arms to me, telling me He is despised, scorned, forsaken. Shall I abandon Him as well?

She wrote about Carmel saying: "It seems to me that I have found my Heaven on Earth, since Heaven is God and God is in my soul. I wish I could whisper this secret to those I love."

Her Postulancy was filled with joy. On the eve of her Profession she wrote: "...At last He is all mine, and I am all His! Now I have nothing else but Him, He is my all! And now I have only one desire...to love Him all the time, to be zealous for His honor as a true bride, to give Him joy, to make Him happy by preparing a dwelling and a refuge for Him in my soul."

She made a "little cell" for the Trinity in her soul and desired to be ever-vigilant and continuously with her beloved Three.

Elizabeth grew ill from Addison's disease and suffered intensely near the end of her life. In spite of the tremendous pain, she accepted it as a gift. She wrote: "I am happy to suffer so that I may be made comfortable to my crucified Spouse."

"My mission in heaven will be to draw souls, helping them to go out of themselves to cling to God, with a spontaneous, love-filled action, and to keep them in that great interior silence which enables God to make His mark on them to transform them into Himself."

Her last words: "I am going to Light, to Love, to Life!"

Her Feast Day is November 8.

She was canonized by Pope Francis on October 16, 2016. She is the Patron Saint of sick people and loss of parents




