“BLESSED ARE YOU WHO BELIEVED
THAT WHAT WAS SPOKEN TO YOU BY THE LORD
WOULD BE FULFILLED.”

—LUKE 1:45

Last weekend we had a wonderful guest speaker, Dr. Anthony Lilles, speak about the life and spirituality of St. Elizabeth of the Trinity. Our religious education and school families got to hear his talk along with a number of parishioners. For those of you not able to attend, Dr. Lilles will record a clean version of it for us when he gets back home and will provide the slides as well. We are blessed to have St. Elizabeth as our patron to help us to grow into a deeper relationship with the Lord in the depths of our souls. She is our friend and helper. I'll let you know when we've posted the talk and slides and we'll email it to you as well.

Just a friendly reminder about the Reconciliation service on Monday, December 20th at 6:30 p.m. after Evening Prayer. Don't be afraid, we all need a Savior. Jesus, I trust in you. If you would like to take more time with one of the priests for a general confession if it's been while, we would be happy to oblige, the Lord's love is there for you.

In the today's second reading we heard: ***"When Christ came into the world, He said: "sacrifice and offerings you did not desire, but a body you prepared for Me; in holocausts and sin offerings you took no delight. Then I said, 'As is written of Me in the scroll, behold, I come to do your will O God."*** Christ came with the intention to save us from sin by His obedience to the will of the Father which is far greater than the external offerings of the Old Covenant.

Jesus' obedience is different from the sin offerings and holocausts mentioned in this text. In the Old Testament sacrificial system, an offering of an animal or some food would be made to God for various reasons. The spirit of the offering was that a person was giving God their best and that in some sense the offering represented themselves.

We can understand this well enough because our own way of giving gifts to each other mirrors this. We give gifts to thank people for something, because we love them, or we give gifts to atone for something wrong that we've done. But in the giving of the gift the most important and meaningful part is that gift would represent us, that it comes from our heart, with all the love and care that goes into such a gift. We've all given gifts to just go through the motions to fulfill an obligation and we know the difference.

The offerings of the Old Covenant were meant to be like the heartfelt gift, where the Chosen People would give God their best in praise, thanks, and as offerings for sin but often they fell short of the proper intention. But even with the right intention, the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us that the sacrificial system of the Old Covenant didn't work... ***"For it is impossible that the blood of bulls and goats should take away sins"*** (Heb 10:4). What scripture is showing us is that God does not take delight in the outward offerings of things, but in a heart desiring to do His will... ***"in sacrifice and offerings you took no delight... behold, I come to do Your will O God."*** The Son of God in part saved us from sin by being in complete uniformity to the Father's will, totally obedient even when it was difficult.

In all things we are meant to imitate and follow the Master. Admittedly, obedience isn't a very popular word these days. Many people hear it and think that it is the absence of freedom or a blind following; but obedience to God should be a reasoned choice. And it is a choice we are meant to make out of love and trust. God's will for us is good and He wants us to obey Him and do His will not for His sake but for our own.

Practically, what does Christ's obedience to the Father's will mean for us? God uses the daily physical, emotional, and spiritual struggles in our lives to build our faith and character. But when life is hard or disappointing, we might feel the need to pray as Jesus prayed in His agony: ***"Father, let this cup pass from me."*** We won't find any peace or joy running away from our crosses but by accepting them... and ultimately accepting them as coming from the hands of a loving Father so that we too can say: ***"Father not as I will but as You will."***

Christmas is near, the Lord is near, and He wants us to entrust ourselves to Him in all things.

"Behold, I come to do your will, O God."

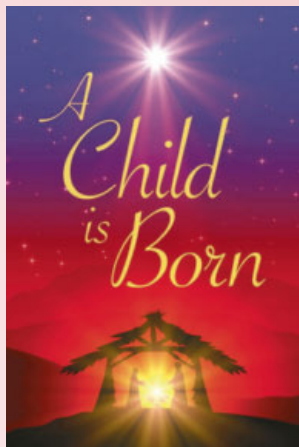

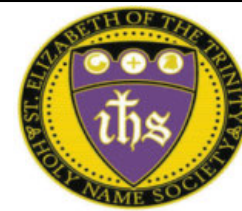

Tax Credit scholarships

The Illinois Tax Credit Scholarship Program, "Invest in Kids," provides a 75 percent Illinois state income tax credit to individuals and corporations that contribute money to a non-profit Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO). The SGOs award scholarships to eligible students from low-income families. Donors will use money already owed to the state (taxes) and donate it to a needs-based scholarship instead, all while receiving a 75 percent state tax credit.

Through this program:

- An individual or corporation will receive a 75 percent credit on donations to an SGO. For example, if a person donates \$100,000, they will receive a state tax credit of \$75,000.
- Individual donors can designate their donations to Archdiocese of Chicago Catholic Schools.
- The credit can be rolled over for five years.
- Donors are prohibited from receiving a federal tax deduction for these donations.

The program is capped at \$100 million in donations, resulting in \$75 million in total tax credits issued.

During these remaining days of Advent, may we look to Our Lady who so lovingly made the tiresome journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem and waited that winter's night in a stable for the birth of her son, Jesus Christ.

Prayer for the Fourth Sunday of Advent: Holy Spirit, fill our hearts with love so that we can share the gift of Jesus with everyone we meet, especially during the Christmas Season. Amen.

The History of the Crèche



The crèche's first use is credited to St. Francis of Assisi in Greccio, Italy in 1223. St. Francis asked one of his friends to prepare a crib so all could see how Christ was born in Bethlehem in lowly poverty; how He was bedded in the manger of hay between an ox and donkey. On Christmas Eve, St. Francis and the people of Greccio gathered to act out the story of the birth of Jesus.

Today the crèche has become a familiar site in Catholic families with children helping to build the manger by adding straw each night of Advent in anticipation of the birth of Jesus

THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD



The title above is the Church's way of saying Christmas. As you know, today is the Fourth Sunday of Advent. That indicates we are almost at Christmas! We have lit all four of the candles on the wreath. We have progressed from darkness to light.

And that's one of the main things we celebrate at Christmas - the light of Christ. Jesus even told us that He is the Light of the World. He came to dispel the darkness.

All our preparations will soon be completed. In the world outside of church, it seems that we have been preparing for months. Here in church, however, only since November 28 - the First Sunday of Advent.

And while most of the world will forget Christmas on December 26, the Church will only just begin to celebrate. On the liturgical calendar, the Christmas season starts with the Vigil Mass of Christmas (which for us this year is at 3:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve). The season of Christmas extends through the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which this year falls on January 9, 2022.

At Christmas we celebrate the nativity of the Lord. This word nativity can be traced to the Latin meaning birth or to be born. We are celebrating Jesus' Incarnation - the birth of God as man.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches: "Jesus was born in a humble stable, into a poor family. Simple shepherds were the first witnesses to this event. In this poverty, heavens glory was made manifest..." #525

The birth of Christ gives us a great paradox. Almost everything we might expect about God coming into the world as man is not what actually took place. He was not born in some fancy mansion or palace, but rather a "humble stable." He was not born into a wealthy family, but rather "into a poor family...in poverty." The great and powerful were not His first visitors, but rather "simple shepherds." Keep in mind, in those days shepherds were considered to be among the lowest of the low in society.

These facts should serve to compel us to regard those who are poor and humble and simple just as we love Jesus. Jesus was also a refugee - He had no place to live. He was also a migrant, because the Holy Family had to flee to Egypt to escape persecution.

Do you think these occurrences were all accidents? Of course not! By His very humble birth, Jesus shows us how we must honor migrants and refugees and the poor and the lowly, just as we reverence Him.

Jesus came out of ordinary circumstances. But, indeed His Incarnation is most extraordinary! These same ordinary conditions that Jesus was born into still exist today.

These very same situations are where we can find Jesus today. We find Him in the poor, in the migrant and refugee, in anyone who is maligned or disrespected for any reason. So even today, we find Jesus where we least expect to find Him!

Keeping all of this in mind is an important reason why we need to be always open to the grace of God at work in our lives. God's grace is freely given and unmerited. God's grace helps us to become closer to Him and to who He wants us to be. We can never have enough grace - only Mary was "full of grace."

In these final days leading up to the great feast of Christmas let's try and take some quiet time to reflect on how we can put the gift of God's grace to use in our daily lives. How can we become closer to Him, who is so extraordinary, through those who are seemingly so ordinary? By doing this we can indeed bring the kingdom of God into focus and we can help make heaven on earth!

I'd like to take this opportunity to express my very best wishes to you and those you hold dear as you celebrate the wonderful blessings of the Christmas Season.
