

FROM THE PASTOR...

Parking lot update! The excavation of the lot to prepare the proper fill and drainage revealed an old oil/fuel tank used for the convent that was not recorded or reported. Its required removal and possible abatement will delay the project by about 7-10 days, which means the target finish date will be the first week of June most likely.

On this 5th Sunday of Lent, we heard the account from the Gospel of John about the woman caught in adultery. To appreciate the power of the Lord's mercy we first must try to appreciate more deeply the horror of sin. One of the greatest evils a person might experience would be to give one-self emotionally, physically, and spiritually in the covenant of marriage, then to be betrayed through their spouse's cheating. Any person can imagine how awful the betrayal would be. God even portrayed Himself in the Old Testament as someone who married an adulterous people because of the Israelites regular cheating on Him with idols. Adultery is a terrible evil which is what makes Jesus' responses in today's Gospel prove that He is God. He is both just and merciful.

The pharisees are out to test the Lord to get Him to either deny the Mosaic Law or to go along with them in stoning the woman. The first verse that stuns us of Jesus' words today is: "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." How amazing this response is. Justice and mercy have met. Notice that Christ's response doesn't approve of adultery, nor does it deny what the Mosaic Law says. Jesus defers the woman's judgment to someone who is without sin...Himself.

A first lesson we can take from the Lord here is that we should be honest about objective evil in the world, evil that others have done, and our own sins. But we should not judge someone's soul nor desire their condemnation before God. The devil is the one who tempts us to sin and then after we sin wants God to condemn us. The Book of Revelation calls the devil the accuser who accuses us before God, not for our correction but our despair.

We are all sinners, and it is not our place to stand in judgment over other people's souls. The Lord doesn't want to hold our sins against us but wants us to be separated from our sins. Jesus wants to separate the sinner from the sin and not identify them with it. The woman did commit a sin but does not have to remain an adulteress. "I do not condemn you but go now and sin no more."

There is a common wisdom that says we shouldn't negatively label people including ourselves. For example, even in confession sometimes people will speak about their sins in the present tense saying I gossip, I lie, or I take the Lord's name in vain. But we should try to speak of our sins in the past tense and focus on our firm purpose of amendment in the present tense which stresses what God's grace can do in us, that we don't have to remain as we were. We may have been lazy but don't have to be a sloth. We may have told a lie but don't have to become a liar.

The Lord's teaching is consoling and heavenly, for those who have been sinned against, they

are shown that God does not condone it. For those in the midst of committing sin, they are admonished but not cut off. Since we are all sinners, we should not throw stones, and like the older people from the crowd in the Gospel, perhaps we could even drop our stones first.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

We love to make examples out of those who have erred and done wrong. Publicly punishing others serves as a means of demonstrating the consequences for what is deemed inappropriate or wrongful behavior. While this may appear an effective way of achieving conformity to established rules, it runs the real risk of distorting motivation. Obviously, we want people to do what is right and pursue healthy, virtuous behaviors and ideals. But is fear of punishment ever the best motivation for avoiding one action in favor of another?

Doing something out of fear is never healthy. Focusing exclusively on our behavior and what others expect or think, leads to living life with a self-focused superficiality. We become more concerned about protecting ourselves from something negative and unpleasant, than investing ourselves in the freedom, wonder and awe of being human! We can still find our way to the unacceptable or inappropriate behavior as long as we do not get caught! Being a whole, focused, and God-centered human being requires more. It demands an investment of the heart. Virtuous, moral, and mature lifestyles reflective of the Gospel necessitate love.

When we experience and recognize love, God's unconditional love, in the depth of our soul, we fall in love with what we have found. We then find ourselves leaving destructive and sinful actions behind in search of something more holy, dignified, true, integral, and loving. This is really "mercy realized." God's tremendous, loving, eternal forgiveness and willingness to bring us back to something more real and tender is transformational. The respect for myself that I receive from God is so life changing that it causes me to run quickly away from anything sinful and self-destructive to things that are whole and holy.

There are many people who want nothing more than to judge or criticize us. What would actually stoning the woman caught in adultery really accomplish? Nothing more than the inflation of the already self-righteous egos of a few men who think they have power. They have no power because they are sinners too, just like everyone else. What all of us have is the humble ability to express sorrow for pursuing destructive thoughts and actions and receive the power of God's mercy. Then, Jesus' request to "go and sin no more" will be one we proudly heed and follow.

We are counting down the days to Easter and are enjoying jumping in the puddles every-day it rains.


Our classroom door is always open and we welcome visitors. Please come see us April 10 at the school Open House.

ALMSGIVING

In addition to prayer and fasting, the other important element of Lent is almsgiving. That's a word that we don't use too often. When you look in the dictionary at the word alms you will find entries such as: donations, contributions, charities, gifts, assistance, etc. So it goes then that almsgiving is to make charitable contributions or gifts or donations. And this giving does not necessarily have to be financial. It can also be the giving of time. You can give of your time to a charitable group or to an individual in need.

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* says the following about Lenten almsgiving:

"The foundational call of Christians to charity is a frequent theme of the Gospels. During Lent, we are asked to focus more intently on "almsgiving," which means donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity. As one of the three pillars of Lenten practice, almsgiving is "a witness to fraternal charity" and "a work of justice pleasing to God." (CCC no. 2462)

And Pope Francis has said the following:

"Almsgiving sets us free from greed and helps us to regard our neighbor as a brother or sister. What I possess is never mine alone. How I would like almsgiving to become a genuine style of life for each of us! How I would like us, as Christians, to follow the example of the Apostles and see in the sharing of our possessions a tangible witness of the communion that is ours in the Church! For this reason, I echo Saint Paul's exhortation to the Corinthians to take up a collection for the community of Jerusalem as something from which they themselves would benefit (cf. 2 Cor 8:10). This is all the more fitting during the Lenten season, when many groups take up collections to assist Churches and peoples in need. Yet I would also hope that, even in our daily encounters with those who beg for our assistance, we would see such requests as coming from God Himself. When we give alms, we share in God's providential care for each of His children. If through me God helps someone today, will He not tomorrow provide for my own needs? For no one is more generous than God."

As with the other two main practices of Lent, the way in which we carry out our almsgiving is up to us. And the options are almost countless.

As a parish, St. Elizabeth of the Trinity features two Lenten almsgiving beneficiaries: Catholic Relief Services' Rice Bowl and our very own St. Vincent de Paul Society.

As you may know, CRS Rice Bowl benefits people in need throughout the world. In fact, 75% of what is collected goes overseas. Read the materials that came with the Rice Bowl to find out where and how your contributions are used or visit crsricebowl.org. (If you didn't get a Rice Bowl there is a supply on the table in the vestibule). The remaining 25% goes to our own St. Vincent de Paul Society. They use their resources to help people in need right here in our own neighborhood.

We offer other opportunities to share as well. You can donate non-perishable food items at any time to the Food Pantry, by putting your items in the box in the church vestibule or the shed on the west side of the entrance to the gym on Moody Ave. And then there are the donation boxes on the east side of the gym entrance for clothing and household items. Lent is a good time to purge your closets and pantries of what you no longer use and give it to someone who can. You may also make monetary donations to SVDP by placing them in the "Poor Box" slots in the vestibule.

Everything that we have comes from God. God has blessed us so that we may bless others. Lent affords us the opportunity to take stock of our blessings and decide how we can share them with those who have less. This sacrificial season gives us the extra push we may need to do some real good for those in need.

There are numerous charities that help those who are poor, or hungry, or homeless, or have any myriad of physical, mental, or spiritual needs. Put your mind into it. Put your heart into it. Put your wallet into it! Why not take the opportunity of Lent to do some real good for people in need?


