PALM SUNDAY

As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road; the whole multitude of his disciples began to praise God aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen. - Lk 19:36, 37b

It is Palm Sunday weekend, and we are approaching the dramatic experiences of Holy Week and the price paid for our salvation. The contrast of Palm Sunday Mass and its Readings could not be starker! We first acclaim Jesus as the Son of David and then we are crying out with the crowds during the Passion Reading: ***“crucify him.”*** It is shocking to consider that Jesus was so widely hailed by the crowds on His entry into Jerusalem, but then was rejected or abandoned by all but a few of His most faithful followers.

How quickly things changed and how much of the human heart was revealed in these events. Many of the Jewish authorities and those in the crowd thought they knew who Jesus was and wanted Him dead for blasphemy, making Himself equal to God. The ruthless, but fearful, Pilate cowardly executed an innocent victim in the vain hope of getting peace through injustice. Herod, the puppet king, had idle curiosity and wanted to see Christ perform for Him some dazzling sign, but seeing none mocked the King of Kings. Yet for all the crowds, the Romans and even those who mocked Him while he was dying on the cross for them, Our Lord said: ***“Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.”***

We are most wounded by those that know us and whose love we have a reasonable expectation of receiving. Yet of His disciples, only John stayed with Christ at the cross, and he wisely showed the least bravado in the buildup. Brave Thomas, Peter and the others thought they were far stronger than they really were. St. Peter, who said at the Last Supper: ***“Lord, I am prepared to go to prison and to die with you,”*** denied the Lord with curses and swearing when a servant girl asked if he knew Jesus: ***“Woman I do not know him.”***

Just as he was saying this, the cock crowed, and the Lord turned and looked at Peter; and Peter remembered the words of the Lord, how he had said to him, “Before the cock crows today, you will deny me three times.” He went out and began to weep bitterly. The Lord knew of Peter’s denials and still prayed for his faith and wanted him to be the first pope! Christ calls us in our weakness and even when we have denied Him. A look of love can move us to tears of repentance.

Not all misunderstood, denied, or betrayed Jesus. The Blessed Mother, Mary Magdalene, John, and all the other faithful women who wept for Him must have been a consolation to Him, though their helpless state in the face of injustice and the suffering of the Lord must have also been a suffering for Jesus too. God does not enjoy seeing our suffering, even if it has a redemptive possibility.

We also heard in this Gospel of the “good” thief who says powerful words which might be addressed to all of us when we doubt God: ***“Have you no fear of God...we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal.”***

We can probably identify with many of the people recorded in this Passion Reading. In the end, the Lord wants us to trust Him without giving into discouragement in the face of life’s trials or our own weaknesses. He is with us.

“Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.”

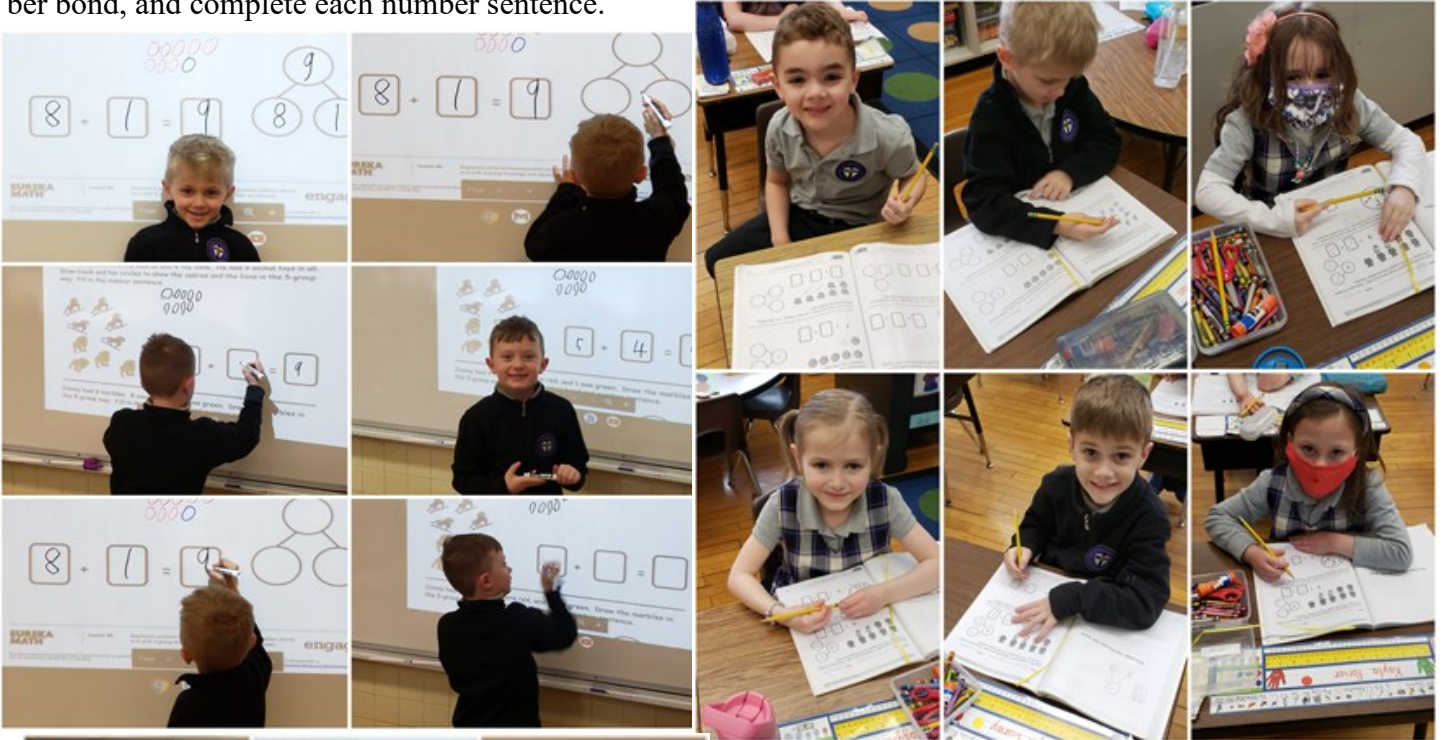

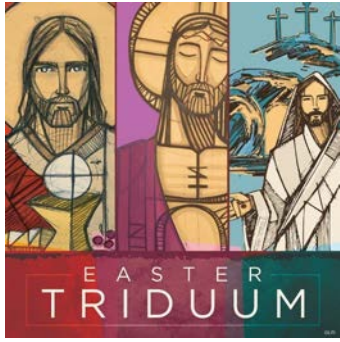

THE TRIDUUM

The three day period beginning with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday and ending with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday is known as the Triduum. This word is from the Latin and it means three days.

This three day period is one of the liturgical seasons of the year - just like Lent or Advent. However, even though it is the shortest liturgical season - it is the most significant!

With the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday (April 14th at 7:00 p.m.) Lent ends and the Paschal Triduum begins. This is a very special evening in the life of the Church. This is the night when we commemorate the actual Last Supper of Jesus. This is the night that Jesus washed the feet of his Apostles. This is the night that Jesus gave us the gift of the Eucharist. This is the night that Jesus was betrayed and arrested. We remember all of this on Holy Thursday.

The Mass begins with the Holy Oils being brought into the sanctuary. These oils will be blessed by Cardinal Cupich in Holy Name Cathedral at a special Mass on Tuesday of Holy Week called the Chrism Mass. Cardinal Cupich will bless the oil for all the parishes in the Archdiocese that afternoon.

The three oils are the Oil of Catechumens, which is used during the sacrament Baptism, the Oil of the Sick, which is used in the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, and the holy Chrism, which is used in the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Orders.

These oils are normally stored in small cruets within a special cabinet called an ambry. You can see it on the wall next to the baptismal pool.

After the homily, the priest and the deacon wash the feet of people from our parish. This is reminiscent of what Jesus did for his Apostles. This is how Jesus modeled servant leadership. This is a model, not only for priests to follow, but for all of us. Jesus asks that we all serve one another, keeping in mind that whoever wishes to be the greatest should act as the least. We should seek to serve and not to be served.

The Mass concludes with a procession throughout the church with the Blessed Sacrament. The procession ends with the Blessed Sacrament being placed in a tabernacle at the Altar of Repose. The Blessed Sacrament remains there for Adoration until 9:00 p.m.

On the afternoon of Good Friday we will pray the Stations of the Cross, which are reminiscent of Jesus' journey to his crucifixion. On the evening of Good Friday at 7:00 p.m. we will celebrate the Passion of Jesus. We read John's version of the Passion and pray the ancient intercessions. We then all come forward and adore the cross. The service ends with Holy Communion.

The Easter Vigil Mass (8:00 p.m. on April 16th) is the highlight of the entire Church year. The service starts with the church in total darkness. The new Paschal Candle will be lit outside and brought inside to pierce the darkness. The candle represents Christ as the Light of the World. Everyone present will have their own candle which will be lit from the Paschal Candle. The Paschal Candle will remain lit in the sanctuary throughout the entire 50 day Easter season which ends on Pentecost. After that it will return to its normal location next to the baptismal pool.

The service continues with several readings from Scripture which are to be considered as the retelling of our history as a Church.

This is also the night when we receive the Catechumens and Candidates into Full Communion with the Church. This means that the people who have been going through the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) process will be received tonight. Here at St. Elizabeth of the Trinity we will have one Baptism, First Communion, and Confirmation. The entire community is there to help celebrate the initiation of our newest member and to support him on his journey in the Catholic faith.

Also tonight new water will be blessed and placed in the holy water fonts.

By the way, attending the Easter Vigil fulfills your duty to attend Mass on Easter Sunday.

As you can see, a lot happens during the Triduum. In fact, even though our services go over a three day period - they still are considered one great service. In other words, we are Greeted at the beginning of the Holy Thursday Mass, as we are at any other Mass, but there is no dismissal until the end of the Easter Vigil Mass.

I invite you to join us in celebrating these solemn occasions in the life of the Church by attending the services on all three of these holy days.

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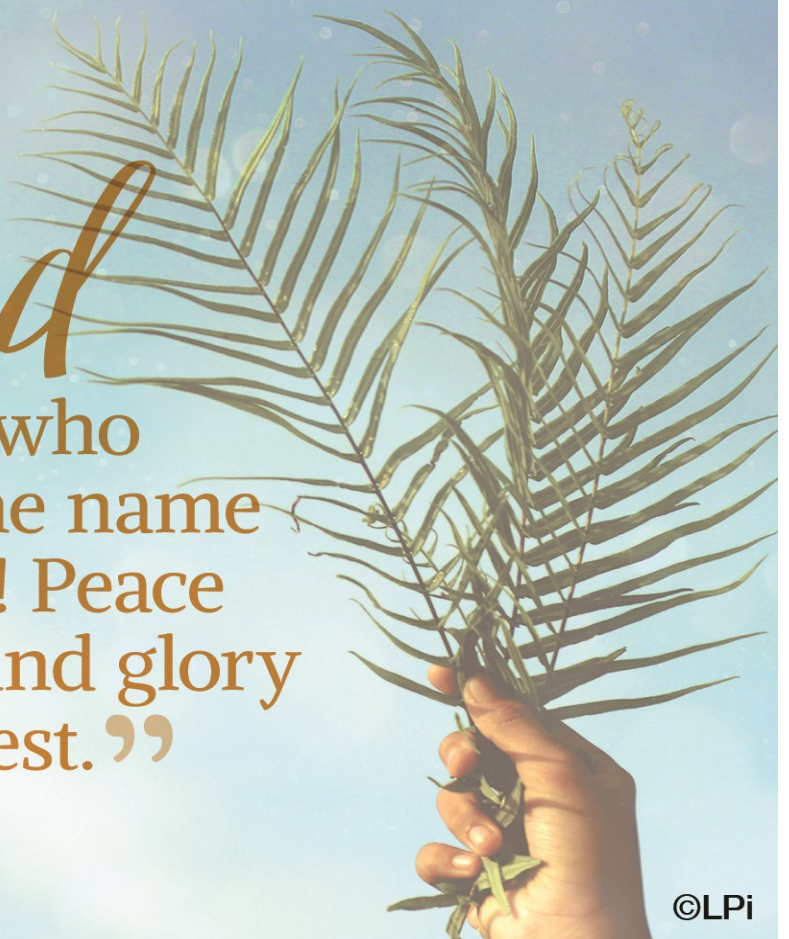
