

FROM THE PASTOR...

Hopefully, this weekend you are able to find a cross, book or other devotional item from the former parish convents and rectories. Be sure to see what's available after the Mass in the vestibule, it's a nice way to remember the past while keeping our faith alive in the present moment. Jesus Christ is still risen from the dead!

Today we remember a fascinating event in the Lord's life when He ascended into the heavenly dimension. This is the Lord's triumphal entry back into the glory He had with the Father before the foundation of the world. The glimpse of heavenly glory we saw at the transfiguration is fully revealed. Furthermore, the preface for today reminds us that Christ ascended to heaven, "not to abandon us but to be our hope." Jesus' triumphal entry into heaven and our hope of joining Him are tremendous encouragements from our feast today.

The disciples at first just looked intently at the sky as Jesus ascended. It's not really clear how long they would have just stared and watched the sky before the angels had to remind them of their purpose: "Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven." This is a lesson for us in our discipleship.

We like to watch lots of things as observers. We watch television, phones, computers. We read the news and watch the world go by. We watch sports and entertainment. We watch the priest and ministers at Mass and the people as they walk up for Holy Communion. But in our life of faith just watching or looking isn't enough.

Like the Apostles, Christ calls us to a purpose; we have a mission. The Lord commissioned them to be His witnesses, to teach others all that He had taught them, to make disciples and baptize the nations. The western world is moving, and has almost finished moving, from a Christian culture to be more like Apostolic times where Catholicism is either misunderstood or seen as an evil.


I would be remiss today if I didn't highlight how the Apostles and Blessed Mother were able to evangelize the nations. They intentionally and prayerfully waited for the Holy Spirit to empower them. They relied on the Lord's promise to send "power from on high". We are not alone in this mission. The word novena and the various devotional novenas that we have come from this nine-day prayerful waiting for the Holy Spirit to arrive on the tenth day after the Ascension, Pentecost, the fiftieth day after Christ rose from the dead.

But even as the Virgin Mary and the disciples prayerfully waited for God's power, they had the mindset that they had to be ready and that they would go and do as the Lord had taught them. This was an intentional waiting like a firefighter or police officer ready for the call or a parent who hears their child is in need and is ready to respond. Our prayerful waiting for the Holy Spirit is not the same as watching the world go by. We're expecting the Power so that we can respond to the need.

On this Ascension we are grateful that Christ has given us hope for an eternal life in heaven. Like the Virgin Mary and the disciples, may we prayerfully wait and expect the promise of the Holy Spirit who has been given to us in power to witness to Jesus.




Our St. Vincent de Paul Society at Work...

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

May 29, 2022 - 7th Sunday of Easter

Unity and diversity can exist together. Our western minds have a grave difficulty seeing unity without conformity. We tend to believe that unless everyone believes the same thing, assents to the same body of truths, styles, and opinions, unity is not possible. Jesus, in today's Gospel, expresses a tenderness and an intimacy that the disciples actually can witness. This same tenderness and love are also reflected in his desire for unity and oneness. Jesus passionately wants all to be one. It is very clear that the success of Jesus' mission and the advance of the Gospel rises or falls with whether this unity is



achieved. And it is a unity that is achieved around a person and not particulars.

Our church is extremely divided. These divisions all center on various theologies, philosophies, structures, and styles. We allow these particular concerns and interpretations, valid as many can be, to drive wedges between us and put us at odds with each other. They enrage us and cause us to lash out at other members of the Body of Christ. Differences are bound to exist in any group. We are unique and diverse people. Staunchly clinging to particular agendas and ideologies while waving the "we're right, you're wrong" banner as we forge ahead in battle does little to advance the real mission of Christ. We are perceived as weak, fractioned, self-focused and serving, and lacking empathy and love. How can the work of salvation be accomplished like this? We sacrifice our credibility. For what?

"I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end." These words describe exactly who the glorified Christ really is. Jesus wants us to see this glory! Believe this! This is the unifying principle that draws the Body of Christ together as one, not our particular preferences of worship! We give too much power to our preferences, and all too easily forget that the real mission of Christ is much more than that! If we can work at truly loving each other as members of Christ's Body despite the differences that can so quickly divide us, then maybe we'll a bit more convincing to those who do not believe. The Risen Christ comes to us through the Eucharist. It doesn't matter where or how. Gather wherever you can and receive. We cannot substitute Jesus' passion with our own. We are one.

LAUDATO SI' - ON CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME

This week marks the seventh anniversary of the release of Pope Francis' encyclical entitled Laudato Si' – On Care for Our Common Home.

Here are a few goals that the encyclical asks us to consider, as citizens of the earth, that can help us care for our common home.

RESPONSE TO THE CRY OF THE EARTH

The Response to the Cry of the Earth is a call to protect our common home for the well-being of all, as we equitably address the climate crisis, biodiversity loss, and ecological sustainability. Actions could include the adoption of renewable energies and energy sufficiency measures, achieving carbon neutrality, protecting biodiversity, promoting sustainable agriculture, and guaranteeing access to clean water for all.

RESPONSE TO THE CRY OF THE POOR

The Response to the Cry of the Poor is a call to promote eco-justice, aware that we are called to defend human life from conception to death, and all forms of life on Earth. Actions could include projects to promote solidarity, with special attention given to vulnerable groups such as indigenous communities, refugees, migrants, and children at risk, analysis and improvement of social systems, and social service programs.

ADOPTION OF SUSTAINABLE LIFESTYLES

The Adoption of Sustainable Lifestyles is grounded in the idea of sufficiency and promoting sobriety in the use of resources and energy. Actions could include reducing waste and recycling, adopting sustainable dietary habits (opting for a more plant-based diet and reducing meat consumption), greater use of public transport, active mobility (walking, cycling), and avoiding single use items (e.g. plastic, etc.).

ECOLOGICAL SPIRITUALITY

Ecological Spirituality springs from a profound ecological conversion and helps us to "discover God in all things", both in the beauty of creation and in the sighs of the sick and the groans of the afflicted, aware that the life of the spirit is not dissociated from worldly realities. Actions could include promoting creation-based liturgical celebrations, developing ecological catechesis, retreats and formation programs, etc.

ECOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Ecological Education is about re-thinking and re-designing curricular and institutional reform in the spirit of integral ecology in order to foster ecological awareness and transformative action. Actions could include ensuring equitable access to education for all and promoting human rights, fostering Laudato Si' themes within the community, encouraging ecological leadership (students, teachers), and ecological restoration activities.
