## FROM THE PASTOR...

Hopefully, you can join us this Sunday for our Corpus Christi procession starting at about noon and ending in the church with Benediction. Jesus Christ can give us no greater gift than Himself and in this greatest of all the sacraments He has done so. The Eucharist is called the "source and summit of the Christian life" because it is Jesus Christ Himself who enables us to believe and follow Him and is also the God whom we adore and long to be with forever.

Another reminder that Sunday, June 26<sup>th</sup> will be Fr. Chris's farewell lunch in the Auditorium after the Spanish Mass (about 2:15 p.m.). I'm sure he'd appreciate your prayers and well wishes. Also, join us at 5:00 p.m. in the new parking lot for a blessing/ribbon cutting and social. The Holy Name Society will provide hot dogs and chips. This social will also be the chance for families to meet our Totus Tuus missionaries who will be with us for that week passing on the faith to our kids and having some fun too. It's not too late to sign up.

Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi). It's a good time for us to try and appreciate more deeply why the Lord commands us to receive His Body and Blood and to offer the Mass in remembrance of Him. In the Mass, the Lord forgives the sins of our past, gives us strength to go on in the present, and He gives us hope for the future.

Twice the Lord says to "*Do this in remembrance of Me*." Christ laid down His life for us so that the sins of the world, original sin, and our own personal sins would not keep us separated from Him. At Mass that moment of salvation is truly made present such that we enter it. Consider in the Old Testament, at the feast if Passover, Jews recalled God's saving work in liberating them from slavery in Egypt. They were told by the Lord to put sandals on their feet, a staff in their hand, and eat like those on a journey...it is the Passover of the Lord. They didn't just reenact the Passover, but each generation of Jews saw themselves as participating in God's liberation in the Exodus.

In a similar, but more heightened way, we are witnesses of Christ's saving death as the Council of Trent said: "The same Christ who offered Himself once in a bloody manner on the altar of the cross, is present and offered in an unbloody manner...at Mass." So, at Mass we are not just reminded of Christ's sacrifice for the forgiveness of sins, the sacrifice is made present to us.

We receive in the present what we need to sustain us on our own journey to the Promised Land of heaven. But Christ wants to sustain us throughout our lives. When we receive Him worthily in Holy Communion and take time to adore and pray before Him in the Blessed Sacrament He can help us in our struggles as He promised: "Come to Me all you are weary and find life burdensome and I will refresh you." Our last Holy Communion is called viaticum which means "food for the journey" because Jesus is with us as we cross over to the other side.

Lastly, St. Thomas Aquinas called the Eucharist "the pledge of future glory." Heaven is the goal and by receiving the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Christ we are being prepared for that heavenly glory that we long for. The closest thing to heaven on earth is the Mass and receiving Holy Communion in a state of grace.

To help appreciate the Eucharist more deeply, we are hosting the Eucharistic Miracles Exhibit, Thursday - Sunday, September 29<sup>th</sup> - October 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2022 in the Auditorium. It is a traveling display, which has now been shown on five continents, designed by Blessed Carlo Acutis, that provides well-documented, Church approved, visible evidence of Jesus Christ's Real Presence in the Holy Eucha-

rist. We look forward to this exhibit to help deepen our faith in the mystery of the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.



#### THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST

AND BLOOD

Today we celebrate the great Solemnity of the Body & Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi).

I feel it is always a good time for us to review our Catholic beliefs. So in keeping with that idea, I would like to offer some excerpts from the website of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) regarding Eucharist.

The Church understands the Communion Procession, in fact every procession in liturgy, as a sign of the pilgrim Church, the body of those who believe in Christ, on their way to the Heavenly Jerusalem. All our lives we who believe in Christ are moving in time toward that moment when we will be taken by death from this world and enter into the joy of the Lord in the eternal Kingdom he has prepared for us. The liturgical assembly of the baptized that comes together for the celebration of the Eucharist is a witness to, a manifestation of, the pilgrim Church. When we move in procession, particularly the procession to receive the Body and Blood of Christ in Communion, we are a sign, a symbol of that pilgrim Church "on the way."

This action by Christ's body, the Church assembled for the Eucharist, is manifested and supported by the Communion Chant, a hymn in praise of Christ sung by the united voices of those who believe in him and share his life. The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* takes this hymn very seriously, mandating that it should begin at the Communion of the priest and extend until the last person has received Communion.

Finally, the fact that the Communion Procession is a profoundly religious action tells us something about the way in which we should participate in this procession. We are the Body of Christ, moving forward to receive the Christ who makes us one with himself and with one another. Our procession should move with dignity; our bearing should be that of those who know they have been redeemed by Christ and are coming to receive their God!

The *General Instruction* asks each country's Conference of Bishops to determine the posture to be used for the reception of Communion and the act of reverence to be made by each person as he or she receives Communion. In the United States, the body of Bishops determined that Communion should be received standing, and that a bow is the act of reverence made by those receiving. These norms may require some adjustment on the part of those who have been used to other practices, however the significance of unity in posture and gesture as a symbol of our unity as members of the one body of Christ should be the governing factor in our own actions.

Those who receive Communion may receive either in the hand or on the tongue, and the decision should be that of the individual receiving, not of the person distributing Communion. If Communion is received in the hand, the hands should first of all be clean. If one is right handed the left hand should rest upon the right. The host will then be laid in the palm of the left hand and then taken by the right hand to the mouth. If one is left-handed this is reversed. It is not appropriate to reach out with the fingers and take the host from the person distributing.

The person distributing Communion says audibly to each person approaching, "The Body of Christ." This formula should not be altered, as it is a proclamation which calls for a response of faith on the part of the one who receives. The communicant should audibly respond, "Amen," indicating by that response his or her belief that this small wafer of bread and the wine in this chalice are in reality the body and blood of Christ the Lord.
