FROM THE PASTOR...

June 5, 2022

Our 8th graders will be graduating on June 6th. It's a time filled with so many memories and emotions. St. Elizabeth of the Trinity School is only in its second year and all the graduates have had different school backgrounds, with lots of change from mergers and Covid. Yet the most important things have remained. The 8th graders of St. Elizabeth of the Trinity have been blessed with parents willing to sacrifice financially to send them to a Catholic school. They were blessed with good teachers, administrators, and a principal, none of whom get rich from their service, but sacrificed so that these graduates could go forward in life with a strong academic background as future Christian leaders in a world that needs them. They were blessed with friendships that may last a lifetime, who knows, maybe they have met their future spouse! Most importantly, they have been blessed with a foundation of faith in Christ as Catholics. They learned to pray and to receive Jesus through the sacraments and were formed in the doctrinal and moral life of the Church.

May the Holy Spirit bless our graduates and their families with wisdom, a deep faith, and courage as they move on to high school!

Some of you may know, Fr. Chris Landfried will be leaving us by July 1st for a new assignment. He will be going to Santa Maria del Popolo Parish in Mundelein as an Associate Pastor. He felt called to serve in a more predominantly Hispanic parish and to learn from a pastor experienced in Hispanic ministry, so he requested a new assignment. We are all grateful for his first year of ministry as a priest and will have a farewell lunch for him on June 26th after the Spanish Mass in the school auditorium. Be sure to send Fr. Chris a kind note of gratitude, wish him well, and check out his own farewell note on the next page of this bulletin. We will be getting a new Associate Pastor on July 1st. I'll let him introduce himself in the coming weeks in a bulletin article. He is another good priest.

This Sunday also marks the end of the Easter season with Pentecost, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Virgin Mary and the disciples in the upper room. How much we need an outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our world and in our own hearts! With violence in our streets, shootings in schools and unjust wars in the world, we need to be open to the Holy Spirit so that we can make wise decisions and try to be peacemakers.

Here are some of the beautiful verses from the Pentecost Sequence:

Come, Holy Spirit, come! And from your celestial home shed a ray of light divine! Come, Father of the poor! You, of comforters the best; You, the soul's most welcome guest; Heal our wounds, our strength renew; On our dryness pour your dew; Wash the stains of guilt away; Bend the stubborn heart and will; Melt the frozen, warm the chill; Guide the steps that go astray.



The Lord is calling us to wait and pray for the Holy Spirit like the Blessed Mother and Apostles did for nine days before Pentecost. For Jesus "*commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the Promise of the Father.*" This was the first novena, the period of patient prayer and waiting for the Holy Spirit. Do we want the world to change for the better and to follow Christ? "*No one can say, Jesus is Lord, except by the Holy Spirit.*"

God has not abandoned us. If we're willing to receive Him, we will have the peace the world can't give and the power to witness to Jesus in a world that needs Him. "Lord, send us your Spirit and renew the face of the earth."

As many of you have heard, I will be changing parish assignments, starting July 1, 2022. There was a process that was in process when word started to spread of the possibility, raising many questions and concerns, even though it was not yet official. So, on Sunday, May 22nd, I spoke about it in the homily at the 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Masses that I celebrated.

As so common throughout the Easter season, the first reading that day was from the Acts of the Apostles, which tells about the establishment and growth of the early Christian communities, often through missionary journeys. These missionary journeys were discerned through the movements of the Holy Spirit and in consultation with the community of disciples. So, it was a good parallel to my circumstances. The particular passage that day spoke of not resisting, but rather continuing and embracing the new paths, experiences, and opportunities ahead, trusting that the Lord is guiding and directing us according to His will and plan.

I also shared in the homilies about my experience in seminary. Through the Teaching Parish Program, seminarians are assigned to a parish for practical, "real world" experiences and interactions. In the five years that it was available to me in seminary, I was assigned to six different parishes... not because of me, or the parishes, but simply the changes that occurred as the program developed and to provide a variety of experiences. So I have become accustomed to "living out of a suitcase" and moving on with "holy curiosity" – an open mind to the possibilities that lie ahead.

I also spoke about the lack of vocations in Chicago. The day before, only <u>one</u> priest had been ordained for the entire Archdiocese of Chicago for 2022. Last year, we were eight. We are in a real and serious crisis of lack of vocations... but that's a whole other topic.

The next day I received the call that my new assignment was official – though still "subject to change!" I also learned that, thankfully, there will be another Associate assigned to St. Elizabeth of the Trinity. That was a big concern... due to the lack of vocations, replacement priests are not always a certainty.

For example, Santa Maria del Popolo in Mundelein currently has a Pastor, and two Associate Pastors, but both Associates are being re-assigned as of July 1. The Parish would be left with just the Pastor, creating a great need. The opportunity to be assigned there was presented to me, and I accepted. It will provide the opportunity to expand and grow in Hispanic ministry, along with ministry with the English -speaking community.

Experiencing and living my first year of priesthood has been amazing, incredible, and, of course, unforgettable. Celebrating and participating in the Eucharist, Reconciliation, Anointing of the Sick, Funerals, Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations, and a Wedding, have been great blessings, and so very inspirational and fulfilling. The community of St. Elizabeth of the Trinity has been an integral part of this first year and I will carry the experiences, the memories, and the people, with me.

Oremus pro invicem et pro omnibus - "Let us pray for each other and for all."

Please pray especially for vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

We will have our annual Corpus Christi procession on the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ which is **Sunday, June 19.**



June: The Month of the Sacred Heart

This year, Friday, June 24th is the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart. But, did you know that the entire month of June is devoted to the Sacred Heart of Jesus? This whole month acknowledgement is a reminder of Christ's deep love for His creation. Artwork depicting the Sacred Heart shows Jesus' heart exposed, lit with flames at the top, along with the Crown of Thorns and the wound from Christ's side. These symbols remind us that Christ loves each of us so much that He was willing to give us Himself both through His death on the Cross and in the Eucharist.

Another beautiful devotion is the Memorial of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, which, this year, falls on Saturday, June 12th. Our Lady was the only person to love God perfectly and the love in her heart is a model for us.

PENTECOST



The following information is taken from the website of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (www.usccb.org).

Pentecost marks the occasion of God sending the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples after his Resurrection. The book of Acts describes how the disciples were gathered together in one place on the day of Pentecost. The Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shavuot or the Feast of Weeks) was a day that commemorated the giving of the law to Moses, a day soon to be marked as well by the giving of the Holy Spirit. The day of Pentecost was a turning point for the disciples:


Before Pentecost, the disciples were unsure of what they were to do next and spent most of their time in hiding. After Pentecost and [receiving] the gifts of the Holy Spirit, they understood their mission to spread the Good News of Jesus, and they had the courage to come out of hiding and speak openly about who Jesus was and what he had accomplished by his dying and rising.

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the strength to fulfill their commission to spread the Good News of Jesus. The Church marks this day through a special liturgical celebration:

The Solemnity of Pentecost, on the fiftieth day of Easter, concludes the Easter season. In recent years, the Church has restored the extended vigil for this solemnity. Similar to Easter, the vigil of Pentecost includes four readings from the Old Testament, each with a proper Psalm and prayer, along with the Epistle and Gospel. At the conclusion of the Mass during the Day, the Paschal Candle is extinguished and moved to its permanent location near the baptismal font.

The Solemnity of Pentecost, which crowns and fulfills the Easter season, is a good time to pray for a deeper indwelling of the Holy Spirit.
