This weekend we have the traveling Eucharist Miracles exhibit that was inspired by Blessed Carlo Acutis, a young Italian boy whose deep faith in Jesus led him to want to organize and share these miracles to help others receive Christ's love in the Eucharist. God has blessed us repeatedly in history and throughout the world with miraculous signs that remind us that Jesus Christ is really present under the appearance of bread and wine through the Eucharist, fulfilling the promise He made: ***"I will be with you always, until the end of the world."*** Come and see and strengthen your own faith and may we all learn to be more present to the Real Presence. The Lord Himself became our food for the journey.

On Monday, October 3rd I will begin my annual retreat that is connected with the spiritual direction training program I am in the middle of run by the Institute for Priestly Formation (IPF). You won't see me here the weekend of the 8th/9th but I will be praying for all of you, the parish, and getting some rest in the Lord. Please pray for me as well. Fr. Leo will be writing next week's bulletin article giving us an update on things from his perspective and some encouragement in the Lord too. It's always nice to hear a different voice, including for me!

Also, since a number of people have asked, there will be the blessing of pets on October 4th at 4:00 p.m. in the new parking lot with multiple clergy ready.

This weekend we have some more parables from Jesus and again we are struck with a seemingly abrasive message. ***"When you have done all you have been commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do.'"***

Have you ever been thanked for something but felt insulted by it? Why might parents not want to be thanked for housing or feeding their child and why might an employee feel insulted if their boss thanked them for coming into work on time? It's because we would hope those people could expect those basic good things from us. It's our duty. Do they think that ordinarily we wouldn't do those things? Nobody likes hearing from others after our sin or failure "no surprise there."

That's what Jesus is getting at with today's Gospel. He's not insulting us. If He were insulting us He would say something like "I don't expect very much from you." Our Heavenly Father won't thank us for doing our duty because He expects such good things from us. The Lord is teaching us to guard against spiritual pride in our work.

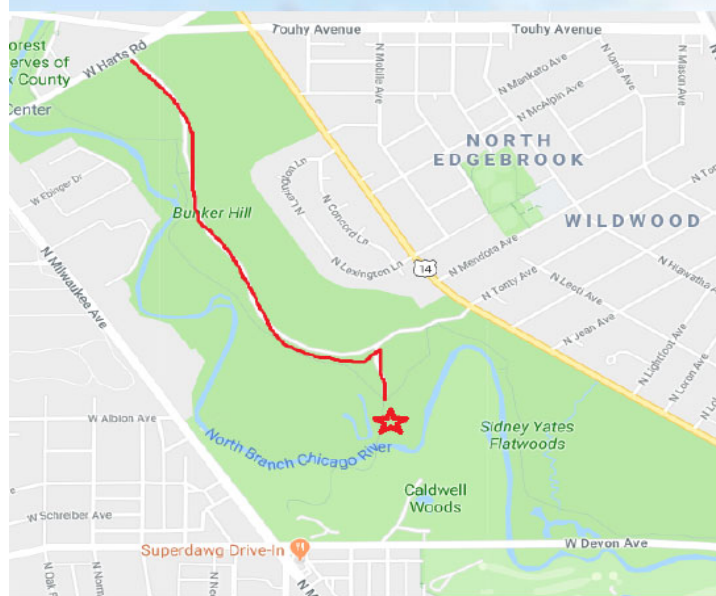

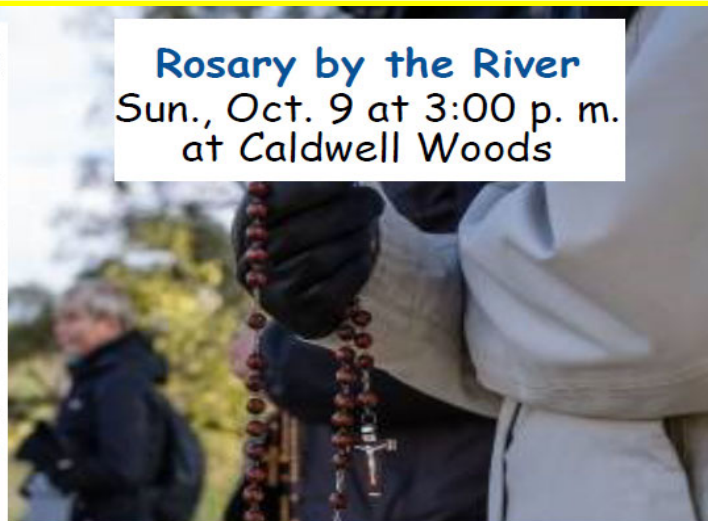
The Respect Life Committee – Baby Bottle Project

Who is the patron saint of the Internet? We'll save you a Google search – the answer is Blessed Carlo Acutis, a 15-year Italian boy who created a website that cataloged and promoted Eucharistic miracles.

And it's Carlo Acutis' work that formed the basis of an international, traveling exhibit that's coming to St. Elizabeth of the Trinity on Saturday and Sunday, October 1st and 2nd. The exhibit features detailed information regarding many different Church approved Eucharistic miracles presented using the work Blessed Carlo did on his website.

Questions about the Eucharistic Miracles Exhibit

Will there be anyone at the Exhibit to answer questions?

Yes! Bill and Peg White of Pensacola, Fla., are bringing the Exhibit to St. Elizabeth of the Trinity – just as they have brought it to numerous other parishes around the country. They're knowledgeable tour guides who will be on hand to make formal remarks in the Auditorium after the 9:00 a.m. Mass as well as being available to informally help visitors appreciate these Church approved miracles.

Blessed Carlo Acutis, a 15-year old boy? Eucharistic Miracles from around the World throughout the centuries? What's the connection?

Blessed Carlo Acutis created a website that catalogued the many fragments of information about Eucharistic Miracles from around the world – from locations as diverse as Italy, India, Argentina, Poland, and Mexico. From as far back as the year 595 to as recent as 2013. His faith-inspired initiative helped make this worldwide Exhibit possible.

How long should I plan to spend at the Exhibit?

That's up to you. But our hosts report that some who have planned to spend just two minutes at the Exhibit end up spending two hours.

Is there a charge? Suggested donation?

No. The goal of Bill and Peg White, and our parish, is to make this Exhibit as available to as many as possible.

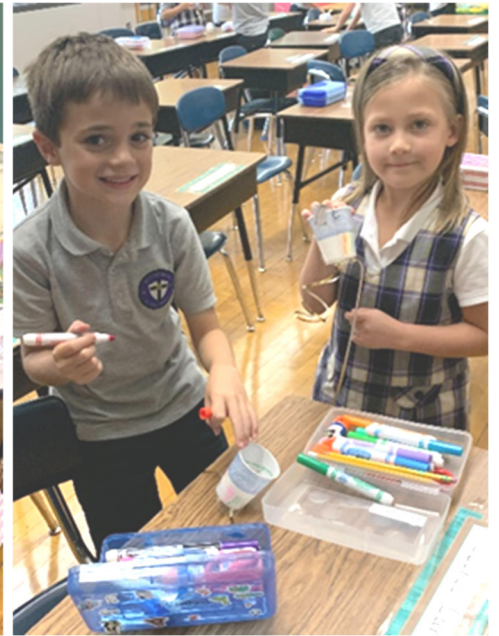

HOW TO PRAY THE ROSARY

1. Make the Sign of the Cross.
2. Holding the Crucifix, say the Apostles' Creed.
3. On the first bead, say an Our Father.
4. Say one Hail Mary on each of the next three beads.



The Rosary is a Scripture-based prayer. It begins with the Apostles' Creed, which summarizes the great mysteries of the Catholic faith.

The Our Father, which introduces each mystery, is from the Gospels.

The first part of the Hail Mary is the angel's words announcing Christ's birth and Elizabeth's greeting to Mary. St. Pius V officially added the second part of the Hail Mary.

The Mysteries of the Rosary center on the events of Christ's life.

There are four sets of Mysteries: Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious and – added by Saint John Paul II in 2002 – the Luminous.

The repetition in the Rosary is meant to lead one into restful and contemplative prayer related to each Mystery. The gentle repetition of the words helps us to enter into the silence of our hearts, where Christ's spirit dwells.

The Rosary can be said privately or with a group.

The **Five Joyful Mysteries** are traditionally prayed on Mondays, Saturdays, and, during the season of Advent, on Sundays:

1. The Annunciation
2. The Visitation
3. The Nativity
4. The Presentation in the Temple
5. The Finding in the Temple

The **Five Sorrowful Mysteries** are traditionally prayed on Tuesdays, Fridays, and, during the season of Lent, on Sundays:

1. The Agony in the Garden
2. The Scourging at the Pillar
3. The Crowning with Thorns
4. The Carrying of the Cross
5. The Crucifixion and Death

The **Five Glorious Mysteries** are traditionally prayed on Wednesdays and, outside the seasons of Advent and Lent, on Sundays:

1. The Resurrection
2. The Ascension
3. The Descent of the Holy Spirit
4. The Assumption
5. The Coronation of Mary

The **Five Luminous Mysteries** are traditionally prayed on Thursdays:

1. The Baptism of Christ in the Jordan
2. The Wedding Feast at Cana
3. Jesus' Proclamation of the Coming of the Kingdom of God
4. The Transfiguration
5. The Institution of the Eucharist


Please Consider a QCD Gift for Our Parish

A QCD gift (a.k.a. IRA charitable rollover) allows individuals age 70½ or older to authorize their IRA administrator to make a direct transfer of funds from their IRA to qualified charities, tax-free. This way of giving does not generate taxable income, which may lower your annual income level. If you are age 72 or older, the amount you transfer may count towards your required minimum distribution.

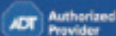
