

As you may know, through our school and RE program, we are trying to focus the children, parents, and staff on a specific virtues, often tied to a saint. The months of August and September have been basic natural virtues of respect and responsibility. A virtue is a firm and habitual disposition to do good. We all know that Jesus Christ calls us to more than just avoiding serious sins, like those listed in the Ten Commandments, He calls us to love and holiness and it often starts in small, halting ways. We need perseverance and God's grace to live as Christ teaches us.

These are hard times for so many people, they need encouragement, a kind word, a smile or perhaps some help with the crosses that they carry. The Lord calls us to be on the lookout, to be aware of and concerned about others around us. We can't solve everyone's life issues, but we can be a Christ-like source of consolation to them, reminding them by our very presence and care that there is an eternal Father that loves them, that they are not alone, especially in their most anxious and dark moments.

Sadly, sometimes we can become so fixated on our own needs, concerns, and plans that we don't see the people right before us. That is what Jesus is trying to break through in today's Gospel. There was a rich man dressed in the best cloths (purple was the most expensive dye) and dined sumptuously each day and the poor Lazarus would have been happy to eat the rich man's leftovers. They both die and go to different places, Lazarus to the "bosom of Abraham" which is a Hebrew idiom for heaven and the rich man goes to what seems to be hell. This is a frightening parable and is meant to bother us.

What I think most gnaws at us about this parable is that the rich man wasn't directly evil to Lazarus. It doesn't say he mocked him, kicked him or was the cause of Lazarus' poverty. But he was closed in upon himself, which is the definition of sin that St. Augustine used. Most people want money, nice things, and to dine sumptuously every day, but selfish interests can blind us to others. Not breaking the Ten Commandments is not the same as loving others, albeit, a requisite start.

When we say the Confiteor at Mass we say we're sorry for sinning "*in my thoughts, and in my words, in what I have done, and in what I 've failed to do.*" Our sins of omission are real and have the face and name of the people around us: our children, spouses, parents, neighbors, and coworkers. Our salvation in part depends on how we've treated the most vulnerable among us, "*whatever you did for the least of these you did for me.*"

At a previous parish assignment, there was a food pantry and school classes would get a tour. The young women who worked there told about when she was a girl her family had to go to a food pantry and often needed help. She hated having to go there. It was embarrassing and humiliating, and she usually felt like the people working there treated them as if they weren't normal human beings. She resolved as she got older to help others through a food pantry but to treat the clients as naturally as possible, to respect them as human beings, made in God's image and likeness. How would we like to be treated when we are at our worst, most vulnerable moment?

St. Vincent DePaul, whose feast day is coming up on September 27th, knew that people don't just need material help but also long for love, respect, and compassion: "*It is only for your love alone that the poor will forgive you the bread you give to them.*"





On September 27, the Church will celebrate the feast of St. Vincent de Paul, who knew that "God had sent him to bring good news to the poor." Together with your gifts, the members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul continue his work and mission in our parish.




The Respect Life Committee – Baby Bottle Project

Who is the patron saint of the Internet? We'll save you a Google search – the answer is Blessed Carlo Acutis, a 15-year Italian boy who created a website that cataloged and promoted Eucharistic miracles.

And it's Carlo Acutis' work that formed the basis of an international, traveling exhibit that's coming to St. Elizabeth of the Trinity on Saturday and Sunday, October 1st and 2nd. The exhibit features detailed information regarding many different Church approved Eucharistic miracles presented using the work Blessed Carlo did on his website.





The exhibit will be open to the whole parish in the school auditorium at the following times: Saturday, October 1st after the 5:00 p.m. Mass and Sunday, October 2nd after the 7:30 and 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Masses and after the 9:00 a.m. Mass from 10:00 to 10:45 a.m.

Questions about the Eucharistic Miracles Exhibit

Will there be anyone at the Exhibit to answer questions?

Yes! Bill and Peg White of Pensacola, Fla., are bringing the Exhibit to St. Elizabeth of the Trinity -- just as they have brought it to numerous other parishes around the country. They're knowledgeable tour guides who will be on hand to make formal remarks in the Auditorium after the 9:00 a.m. Mass as well as being available to informally help visitors appreciate these Church approved miracles.

Blessed Carlo Acutis, a 15-year old boy? Eucharistic Miracles from around the World throughout the centuries? What's the connection?

Blessed Carlo Acutis created a website that catalogued the many fragments of information about Eucharistic Miracles from around the world – from locations as diverse as Italy, India, Argentina, Poland, and Mexico. From as far back as the year 595 to as recent as 2013. His faith-inspired initiative helped make this worldwide Exhibit possible.

How long should I plan to spend at the Exhibit?

That's up to you. But our hosts report that some who have planned to spend just two minutes at the Exhibit end up spending two hours.

Is there a charge? Suggested donation?

No. The goal of Bill and Peg White, and our parish, is to make this Exhibit as available to as many as possible.

FOOD PANTRY



Thank you to the fabulous volunteers and donors who keep our food pantry stocked and running smoothly. The team consists of folks who stock the shelves, prepare fresh bread that is delivered weekly, and those who welcome our patrons on Tuesday mornings. We have a constant stream of donations through the box in the back of church and the shed that is available 24/7 next to the gym entrance (on Moody).

We are looking for volunteers to shop regularly for the St. Elizabeth of the Trinity Food Pantry. In addition to the food donations that we receive, we supplement our food pantry with purchased items. There are items that our patrons regularly seek such as rice, coffee, and other non-perishables. We also offer perishable items of milk and eggs on alternating weeks. Volunteers would be given a shopping list of items to purchase at stores such as Aldi and Dollar Tree. These items will be paid for using funds donated to the food pantry. The non -perishable items may be shopped and delivered at any time utilizing the shed as a drop off. Perishable items are best bought on Sunday or Monday for distribution on Tuesday. Shopping and drop-off times for those items will be coordinated in order to get them into the refrigerators in a timely fashion.


