
Mary, Mother of God

Peace to you! It is customary to wish or impart blessings upon those whom we cherish during the Holy Days and as the New Year begins. Doing so demonstrates that we care about those who surround us; that we wish them well. I, for instance, have the great fortune to receive my mom's blessing every time I leave home to come back to the parish after my day off or a holy day. It has become a tradition (more than just a tradition I should say) that I cannot go without after every visit.

From time immemorial, thus, blessings have served the task of reminding the blessed person that they hold a special place in our hearts, that they are important to us. Blessings become a sort of "tag" or special label, reminding the person that they are "set apart" for us. In fact, we declare that when we bless someone or something, the person, object or action becomes holy, sacred or hallowed. The word "holy" actually means "set aside" or "set apart." Thus, when we bless someone, truly we are renewing their status as a person set apart for us; hence, the importance of a mother's blessing. Every time a mother bestows her blessing upon her children, she is renewing the motherhood that binds each and every one of her children to her. If you will, she is putting new spiritual "tags" on each one of them that read, "you are my beloved son" or "you are my beloved daughter."

Providentially, as we ease into the year 2023, Holy Mother Church presents us with the Solemnity of the Great Mother of God, Mary. Sapientially, the first reading overflows with the image of blessings. God Himself instructs Moses to reveal to Aaron and his sons the method by which they will bless the people. If we examine the blessing formulas that God the Father gives Moses, we quickly realize that each one of them expresses a hope. This hope, however, is binding and certain. That is, when Aaron pronounces the blessing, the Lord will truly shine His face upon those receiving the blessing. The Lord will also "be gracious" to them, "look kindly" upon them and given them "peace." In other words, a blessing extends beyond a simple wish. It carries a certainty: that the Lord God will be and dwell with the person who has received such blessing.

With this in mind, we look to Mary at the beginning of this new year. She is our mother and desires to impart her maternal blessing upon us all, so that we may dwell in her love and the love of her Son, Jesus Christ. She wishes to renew the motherhood that binds us to her by setting us apart for her. Her maternal blessing, in fact, put us right near to her heart. As the Gospel of Luke narrates, she kept all those experiences of her Son in her heart, a prophetic action prefiguring her future role as the mother of all the baptized. Our only task now is to be receptive of her maternal blessing, an action that gathers all of us, her children, into her embrace this new year. God Bless!





Today is the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. Like Mary may we always treasure the events in our life and reflect on them in our heart.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER MANAGEMENT



During cold weather months the Chicago Department of Water Management (DWM) encourages residents make sure pipes in homes are properly insulated and not exposed to freezing air.

SPECIFICALLY, HOMEOWNERS SHOULD:

- Maintain proper heat in their homes; particularly in basement crawl spaces or closets that house a water service.
- Insulate pipes, particularly those outside or on the perimeter of the residence.
- Run a trickle of cold water on each floor of the home at the points furthest from the location of the main water service into the home.
- Make sure that there is warm air circulating in any area where there are water pipes. This includes garages and unheated areas of the home.
- Remove all garden hoses from hose bibbs, cover the bibbs with Styrofoam hose bibb insulating caps and shut off control valves for hose bibbs.
- Make sure there are no broken windows or other sources to allow cold winter air to enter.

IF PIPES FREEZE, DO NOT THAW THEM USING CANDLES OR ANY OPEN FLAME.
INSTEAD PLEASE USE A HAIR DRYER OR HEATING PAD.

"No one can be saved alone. Combatting Covid-19 together, embarking together on paths of peace." With this as its title, Pope Francis has presented his message for the 56th World Day of Peace, held annually on 1 January.

The Holy Father's message, released on Friday, December 16, opens with a quotation from the First Letter of Saint Paul to the Thessalonians (5:1-2).

Thus, the Pope recalls that the Apostle Paul encouraged the Thessalonian community to remain steadfast. Likewise, he says, "when tragic events seem to overwhelm our lives, we are called to keep our hearts open to hope and to trust in God, who makes himself present, ac-

companies us with tenderness, sustains us in our weariness and, above all, guides our path."

There is light even in the darkest hour, says Pope Francis, before going on to use the Covid-19 pandemic as an example: "The pandemic seems to have upset even the most peaceful parts of our world, and exposed any number of forms of fragility."

Three years later, he stresses, "the time is right to question, learn, grow and allow ourselves to be transformed as individuals and as communities" reminding us, as he has done before, that "we never emerge the same from times of crisis: we emerge either better or worse."

This experience has made us all the more aware of the need for everyone, including peoples and nations, to restore the word "together" to a central place in our lexicon. Only the peace that comes from a fraternal and disinterested love can help us overcome personal, societal, and global crises.

Pope Francis goes on to stress that this is not the post-Covid era we had hoped for or expected. "At the very moment when we dared to hope that the darkest hours of the Covid-19 pandemic were over, a terrible new disaster befell humanity," he said, noting that the world witnessed the onslaught of another scourge: another war, "driven by culpable human decisions."


Pope Francis notes that the war in Ukraine is "reaping innocent victims and spreading insecurity, not only among those directly affected, but in a widespread and indiscriminate way for everyone, also for those who, even thousands of kilometers away, suffer its collateral effects – we need but think of grain shortages and fuel prices."

"This war," he says, "together with all the other conflicts around the globe, represents a setback for the whole of humanity and not merely for the parties directly involved. While a vaccine has been found for Covid-19, suitable solutions have not yet been found for the war."

"What then is being asked of us?" the Pope asks, in light of all these difficult times: "First of all, to let our hearts be changed by our experience of the crisis."

In fact, he explains: "we can no longer think exclusively of carving out space for our personal or national interests, (...) instead we must think in terms of the common good."

We cannot, however, ignore one fundamental fact, he continues: "Many moral, social, political and economic crises we are experiencing are all interconnected, and what we see as isolated problems are actually causes and effects of one another."



And he calls on all those in positions of responsibility and on all men and women of goodwill "to revisit the issue of ensuring public health for all"; to "promote actions that enhance peace and put an end to the conflicts and wars that continue to spawn poverty and death"; "to join in caring for our common home and in implementing clear and effective measures to combat climate change"; "to battle the virus of inequality and to ensure food and dignified labor for all, supporting those who lack even a minimum wage and find themselves in great difficulty."

Finally, Pope Francis asks that in the coming New Year that "we journey together, valuing the lessons that history has to teach us."
