

# FROM FR. MIKE

Last weekend we had a very nice St. Joseph Day celebration after the 11:00 a.m. Mass. A special thanks to JoAnn Keto and the volunteer team that coordinated the event. The pasta and baked goods were a nice reprieve to our Lenten fasting and discipline. May St. Joseph, Guardian of the Holy Family, and Patron of the Universal Church watch over our parish and pray for us.

Today we heard about one of the Lord's most amazing miracles, the raising of Lazarus from the dead. Martha complained to Jesus: "*If you had been here, my brother would not have died.*" Death is real and painful, Jesus wept at Lazarus' grave, and we grieve too. It's fitting that the readings give us the chance to reflect on a question that we might think has only one answer: *What is death?* 

Death is the result of sin, they are connected; death primarily affects the body, sin primarily affects the soul.

Jesus responded to Martha: "Your brother will rise." And she responded with a faith in the resurrection: "I know that he will rise in the resurrection on the last day." But the Lord didn't just respond "Yes, that's true." He says, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." What does this mean?

The Lord is talking about two different kinds of life and death. Life and death of the soul as well as that of the body. First the body. The most common understanding of death is that the soul separates from the body, which is true. This will happen for all of us and even Christ died, but we are promised to get our bodies back as we heard in the first reading and in the Creed. That glorified body we receive at the end of time will never die.

The soul is meant to live in the fullest and most meaningful sense of the word because it is connected by grace and faith to Him who is Life itself. That's heaven and on that day the soul and body will be united without sickness, suffering or death. We die once but will never die again.

In a spiritual sense, our soul can die even while being immortal. A person who dies in the state of mortal sin will experience what the book of Revelation calls "the second death," that is hell. The permanent state of having chosen against Christ.

This spiritual death of the soul is not inevitable like the death of the body. God wants all people to be saved! The only other time in the Gospels that Jesus wept was over the city of Jerusalem that wouldn't accept Him as their savior. The Lord weeps over the death of the body and even more over the death of a soul that rejects Him, the source of all goodness and life. This reminder of the second, spiritual death adds power to the Lord's words when He says: "Everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." We will never die the second death if we believe and live in Jesus!

St. Francis in his song praising God about creation wrote about death with confidence:

All praise be yours, my Lord, through Sister Death, from whose embrace no mortal can escape. Woe to those who die in mortal sin! Happy those she finds doing your will! The second death can do them no harm. Praise and bless my Lord and give him thanks. And serve him with great humility.

Because Jesus has overcome death, we need not fear it and should have real hope for ourselves and deceased loved ones as a prayer in the Mass for the Dead says:

"For your faithful Lord, life is changed not ended, and when this earthly dwelling turns to dust, an eternal dwelling is made ready for them in heaven."



#### POPE FRANCIS: TO BE AN APOSTLE IS TO SERVE



VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Being an apostle does not mean climbing up the church's hierarchy to look down on others but humbling oneself in a spirit of service, Pope Francis said.

During his general audience in St. Peter's Square March 15, the pope explained that apostleship as understood by the Second Vatican Council produces an equality -- rooted in service -- among laypeople, consecrated religious, priests and bishops.

"Who has more dignity in the church? The bishop? The priest? No, we are all Christians at the service of others," he said. "We are all the same, and when one part (of the church) thinks it is more important than the others and turns its nose up (at them), they are mistaken."

Vatican II, the pope said, did not focus on the laity's relationship with the church's hierarchy as a "strategic" move to adapt to the times, but as "something more that transcends the events of that time and retains its value for us today."

The Second Vatican Council's Decree on the Church's Missionary Activity states that collaboration between the hierarchy and the laity is essential for the church to fully live out its mission.

Viewing Christian life as a chain of authority "where the person on top commands the rest because they were able to climb up (the ladder)" is "pure paganism," said the pope.

Reflecting on the passage from St. Luke's Gospel in which Jesus sends out 72 apostles ahead of him two-by-two, Pope Francis said that service is the vocation Jesus gives to all, including "to those that seem to be in more important positions."

"Listening, humbling yourself, being at the service of others: this is serving, this is being Christian, this is being an apostle," he said.

The pope encouraged Christians to pray for members of the church's hierarchy who appear

conceited since "they have not understood the vocation of God."

Pope Francis also asked that all members of the church reflect on their relationships and consider how that impacts their capacity for evangelization.

"Are we aware that with our words we can harm people's dignity, thus ruining relationships?" he asked. "As we seek to dialogue with the world, do we also know how to dialogue among ourselves with believers? Is our speech transparent, sincere, and positive, or is it opaque, ambiguous and negative?"

"Let us not be afraid to ask ourselves these questions," the pope said, because examining the responses can help lead Christians toward a more apostolic church.


