FROM FR. MIKE

This week starts the first week of school after a summer of projects, preparations, camps, and some vacations and down time as well. The parish and school staff, including a few new ones, gathered for a morning of introductions and reflection. Dr. Hillmann and I encouraged the staff about the importance of everyone's role, and how we all matter in the parish's mission. We also heard from an inspirational author, speaker, and educator to help use the Gospel to combat burnout, her most famous book being "Dear Jesus, is it June Yet?"

One of the things that can combat burnout for any of us in our vocation is purpose. Our energy comes from our purpose and each one of us has a Christ-given purpose, we have a mission. A parish, with its possible school, has a purpose that Jesus has given it through His Church.

We might define a parish's purpose in different ways and given the current context of the Church in the Archdiocese with Renew My Church and parish and school mergers/closings it is reasonable for us to remind each other of the overall mission. From the general we move more easily to the particular.

What is a parish for? "To form a community of disciples of Christ." It's Jesus who loves us, gives us our identity, and calls us together, the Church as a whole, and the individual parishes come from Him. We all have other identities with or family members, our country, our profession, and they are important, but secondary. The one thing necessary is what God the Father said: "This is my beloved Son, listen to Him."

The parish, with its programs, ministries, school, athletics, buildings and so on has the primary purpose of helping us to be formed day by day as Jesus' followers, as His intentional disciples. The parish does this in some ways we are familiar with like witnessing to Jesus through works of mercy, teaching the Catholic faith to children, offering the sacraments, and so on.

Given the decline of faith and practice, we can say that in general the parishes in the Archdiocese have not been successful in forming communities of disciples of Christ. We need not fear though, Jesus Christ is still risen from the dead and sends the Holy Spirit for renewal, God is not dead, He isn't even tired.

One of the exciting initiatives that we are undertaking to help people experience the love of Jesus and so become His disciples, is the Rescue Project. Fr. John Riccardo, a priest of the Diocese of Detroit, created a ministry that helps people reconnect in an accessible way their identity as sons and daughters of a Heavenly Father who loves them. What is this program and how does it work?

This is how Fr. Riccardo describes it: "I believe that the most urgent task is the compelling proclamation of the gospel, one that not only shares it in an attractive – and concentrated – way, but that also offers people a way of seeing reality, and of making sense of the world, history, and life that is vastly different from the story our modern culture tells.

Until this happens, the Christian faith is often experienced as a mere set of rules and disciplines, and simply going to Church isn't likely to lead a person to embark on the great adventure that is following Jesus and continuing His mission of the rescuing of this world.

What is it?

The Rescue Project seeks to proclaim the gospel in a compelling and attractive way through meaningful video content while participates encounter both Christ and each other by enjoying food, and then sharing their experiences of life's joys and struggles in small group conversations. As part of our parish's evangelization efforts, we will be running this eight week experience which is meant to help people connect with Christ through conversation, food, and prayer. When is it?

The Rescue Project will take place on Thursday evenings from October 5th to November 16th with a retreat day on Sunday November 12th. The Thursday evening sessions will begin with dinner being served at 6:15 and we will start showing the video around 6:30 once everyone has their food. After the video, we will move into small group discussion and the whole evening will be over by 8:00.

How can you help?

Prayer Team: We need people who will gather in church before or during our sessions to pray for all the participants and other volunteers and ask the Holy Spirit to help everyone to be open to the graces God wants to give them.

Facilitators: We need people who will help facilitate the small group discussions at each table. Training will be provided so don't be nervous if you have not done something like this before. Your job is not to teach everyone everything the church teaches but to help guide a meaningful discussion based around the video and everyone's life experiences.

Hospitality Team: We can't have an experience that includes food without the loving help of those who want to make sure everyone feels welcome and has enough to eat. We need people willing to help welcome people to each session, make sure everything is set up for dinner and the food is served. You could also help by donating desserts for a session.

Participate and Invite: We hope that this will be a meaningful experience for the people of our parish. If you, a friend, or family member could use an opportunity to encounter or reencounter God through our community here at St. Elizabeth please consider joining us or inviting someone you love to join us for The Rescue Project.

We need people to help make this experience possible. While it is ideal for you to be present for all 8 weeks and the retreat because the sessions build on one another, don't let missing one or two sessions stop you from joining us or volunteering.

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 3: Silence before Mass By FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



When we come to Mass, we recall the graces of our Baptism, genuflect to acknowledge Jesus truly present, and then we make our way to our seat. What is next? How about one of the best things churches were designed for? If there is a little time before Mass begins, some moments of prayer will help prepare you for the graces of the Mass.

Early Foundation

When I was growing up, I don't remember our family having many rules for us kids to follow. One that definitely stands out is the expectation regarding when we should be in church as a family. Mass was at 8:00 on Sunday morning, and my dad made it very clear that he expected us all to be seated together in the pew by 7:50 am. (Pew is the name for the long bench seats in churches.) Was it so we could get our preferred seat? I doubt it, since everyone in our small country church had our regular places! Looking back now on what dad modeled for us, I realize that the purpose of those ten minutes before Mass was for us to settle in, pray and prepare. I often think about what a great gift dad gave me by making it clear that attending Sunday Mass together was the top priority for our family.

How to Prepare

The General Instruction for the Roman Missal says that there should be a quiet opportunity in the church for the faithful to prepare prayerfully for the Holy Mass (GIRM, no. 45). During this time before Mass, you can recall all the great gifts and graces God has given you since you last came to church. This silence also provides the opportunity to reflect on the generosity of our loving Father and to prepare to thank him in the worship of the Mass. In addition to thankfulness, you might also recognize any needs you have—you might talk to God about any difficulties, stresses, or anxieties you are experiencing and offer them to the Lord, asking for his help and grace.

It can be difficult to enter into this time of silence to help prepare for Mass, especially if we have not yet made it a habit. If you are short on time, Charles Belmonte encourages you to pray on the way to Mass. He writes, "Prepare your soul for Communion with acts of love of God. Make acts of contrition and atonement...pray for the priest that he may truly minister to the needs of the parish. Pray for the congregation...pray that you may understand what you yourself will be taught at Mass" (*Understanding the Mass*, pg. 38). Belmonte goes on to also encourage using a missal or missalette to review the readings [1] and prayers of the Mass ahead of time. Being familiar with these will also help you to be more attentive and unite your personal prayer more fruitfully with the Mass.

Intentions

One tradition you may not be aware of is the opportunity personally to offer an intention for each Mass we participate in, asking that the graces we receive from the Mass be applied to someone who might need them or to a particular situation. As he prays the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest offers the Mass for a public intention (usually published in the bulletin or announced). Those present are also able to offer a private intention by uniting with the prayers at the altar. For example, you might make an intention for your family to grow in love, the health of a friend, the soul of a deceased relative, reconciliation for a strained relationship, peace in the world, or a greater recognition of the dignity of all life. In addition to assisting our brothers and sisters in Christ, praying about an intention for the Mass is also a great way to help us be more attentive to the prayers and readings and to receive more fully the fruits of the Mass.

Give yourself a goal of arriving at church a bit earlier, and take the challenge of spending a little time in prayer before Mass. In addition to the suggestions above, any of our classic prayers or even composing a prayer of your own is a great way to help prepare your heart for the celebration of the Mass. In our time, when everything can be so busy and hurried, I often think of my dad's great wisdom in giving the family a few extra minutes of quiet preparation.
