

This weekend is the Seminary Education Fund Appeal among other things. We are blessed to receive four seminarians this year as part of the Tolton Teaching Parish Program at Mundelein Seminary. Our seminarians are all from the Wichita Diocese: Dominic Jirak (1st Theology), Grant Huslig (3rd Theology) and our two new transitional deacons Miles Swigart (4th Theology) and Matthew Cooke (4th Theology). Not long ago we housed one of our own seminarians from the Archdiocese, Luke Leto and I'm sure you consider it a blessing that St. Elizabeth of the Trinity Parish gets the chance to not only offer ministerial opportunities to young men discerning the priesthood, but also receive the benefit of their faith, witness, and energy. Please pray for our seminarians and that the Lord continues to send laborers into His vineyard. Also, please financially support the good work of Mundelein Seminary as you are able through the Appeal.

This is also Catechetical Sunday nationally where we honor the priesthood not only of the ordained but the laity as well. There will be a special blessing for all RE catechists, certified school catechists, baptism preparation couples and SPRED catechists at the 9:00 a.m. Mass. Passing on the faith and giving witness to Jesus Christ, not only through actions, but through words, is very empowering to both the giver and the receiver of the Gospel. Sharing the faith is one of the best ways to grow in the faith and that includes parents, who are the primary teachers of their children by both word and example as God intended.

Now to our Readings for today, which are all about forgiveness. We have all heard the phrase: "forgive and forget" which has some merits to it as a short and well-meaning phrase. Today's psalm says that God forgives by moving our sins far away for us, forgetting them in a sense; "As far as the east is from the west, so far has He put our transgressions from us." In the Gospel today, the Master forgave the servant 60 million days wages, an impossible debt to pay back!

Jesus calls us to show mercy to others as we have received great mercy. If we don't show others mercy, but rather a merciless justice, then the Lord warns us that we will be shown strict justice too and will have to pay for our sins; *"So will My heavenly Father do to you, unless each of you for-gives your brother from your heart."*

But is it possible for us as humans to "forgive and forget" in the same way that God does? No, not exactly. The Catechism referencing this very parable of the merciless servant says: "It is not in our power not to feel or to forget an offense; but the heart that offers itself to the Holy Spirit turns injury into compassion and purifies the memory in transforming the hurt into intercession" (CCC #2843).

This is a powerful teaching! We can't forget the terrible hurt that has occurred to us or change the feelings that it brings up. The deeper, more personal the hurt, think of abuse or neglect by a loved one, abandonment, betrayal, or adultery, the more we are aware that we can't just forget or feel nothing. Jesus Christ does not ask us to play pretend about our feelings or to forget offenses.

The Lord first wants us to receive His love and compassion, which softens us and can gradually make it possible to look with compassion on others. People who have done great evil have often suf-

fered great evil. The Holy Spirit can help us to see others, even those who have hurt us deeply, more with the eyes of Christ. In time our hurt can be purified so that we can pray for those who have wronged us.



IMPORTANT NOTICE

This upcoming week, September 19th - 22nd, we will be having some work done on various aspects of the St Elizabeth of the Trinity Campus.

On September 19th & 20th, we will begin what I refer to as "Phase Zero" of our roof project. Architectural and roof consultants, which were recommended by the construction management team at the Archdiocese of Chicago, will be doing two days of observation, analysis, and testing of the roofs throughout the campus.

The goal of "Phase Zero" is twofold. First, we want to determine an order of priority for each roof based on their condition. Second, we will look to determine which materials to use on each roof that will give us the best results over the long haul. Once we have completed these steps we can confidently move on to "Phase One" and begin the actual roof repairs. As I've been known to say, "Doing things the right way, takes a little bit more time."

On September 22 we will be having the Ardmore Parking Lot repaved and the lines repainted. To add life to a new parking lot, this is commonly done around the one-year mark. **PLEASE NOTE THAT THE ARDMORE LOT WILL BE CLOSED FROM 7:00 a.m. FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 22 until SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 23 at 1:00 p.m. when it will reopen in time for the Parish Social.**

Finally on September 22nd, we will be having an array of work done on several main entry doors at the school and the gymnasium. The main doors around the school will be getting all new framing and updated hardware to ensure the school is secure at all times with doors closing properly. The gymnasium outer and inner doors will also be getting a face lift, as we'll be adding additional handles to the outer doors and updated framing and closing hardware to the inner gym doors. Finally, the lower-level gym door that is off the parking lot will be getting a brand-new door completely.

It's set to be a busy week around St Elizabeth of the Trinity, but we are excited for the work that will be taking place and we hope that you are as well. Thank you as always for your continued support of the parish.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - September 17, 2023 - 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was in second grade, my prized possession was a metal Star Wars-themed lunch box. After school one day, another student ripped it from my hands. I helplessly watched in horror as my classmate threw it to the ground and violently stomped it into an unrecognizable heap of junk. I came home covered in tears of shame and rage. After a few months, I never thought about it again ... until I was almost thirty years old and on a retreat to prepare for ordination to the priesthood.

That childhood memory — and the attendant outrage — came back afresh. My spiritual director helped me in the process of acknowledging that I was angry because that kid owed me my lunch box. Then she helped me, through the grace of Jesus, to forgive the debt. Almost immediately I felt a new peace. I was amazed that I hadn't forgotten what I had lost, even from years before. Aren't we human beings simply amazing at remembering what people owe us?

We see this week in Jesus' parable a servant who is forgiven much but then commands another servant: "Pay back what you owe!" He can't forget or let go of how he was wronged. He remembers — and he becomes a monster because of it. If only he had remembered not only

the debts owed to him, but also his greater debt owed to and forgiven by — his master. It's natural for us to remember what others owe us. But when we contextualize those offenses in Jesus' mercy toward us and them, we're free to be merciful like the Master and less like a monster who never forgets.

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 7: Greeting By FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



"Hello, Joe. How are you?" Whenever we see someone we know, we might greet him or her in this way. However, the Mass, the gathering of the family of God, doesn't begin like this at all. Why not? Without a doubt, the Mass isn't just like meeting people on the street. When we come to Mass, we aren't just passing by an acquaintance: we are encountering and worshipping Almighty God. After the Sign of the Cross, the priest says, "The Lord be with you," or one of the other versions given in the Missal, such as "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all;" or "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." This greeting indicates right away that what we are about to do is going to be very different from the normal daily routine. Also, it recalls that we are part of something greater—the universal celebration of the Liturgy—God with all his people.

Far from Ordinary

If the only thing the priest said was something like, "I'm glad to see you" or "Boy, it's cold today," he might give the impression that we are just entering into familiar chatter. We could miss that something sacred is about to happen. So, the universal greeting helps us prepare to enter more fully into the celebration of the Mass and helps us to realize this will be a sacred gathering with Almighty God present before us. If you think about the words, they are actually a prayer said by the priest asking that the grace, peace, love, etc., of God be with each person—now that's a way to start a gathering of God's people! The faithful then respond with their own part of the prayer, asking a similar grace for the priest by responding, "And with your spirit."

Whose Spirit?

Why do we say, "And with your spirit?" Our English translation of the phrase is actually a direct word -for-word translation from the Latin prayers of the Mass: "Et cum spiritu tuo." This phrase also clearly connects us to several places in the Bible. For example, we see the priest's greeting, "The Lord be with you," in Ruth 2:4; and we see the people's response, "The Lord be with your spirit," in 2 Timo-thy 4:22.

Okay, Father, I see where those lines are in the Bible. But what does "spirit" mean here? According to several saints and Christian writers, "spirit" refers not to the soul of the priest but to the spirit he has received through the sacrament of Holy Orders. As Edward Sri writes, quoting Jeremey Driscoll for support: "By saying 'and with your spirit,' the people are acknowledging the Holy Spirit's unique activity through the priest during the sacred liturgy by virtue of his ordination. As Jeremy Driscoll explains, 'The people are addressing the "spirit" of the priest; that is, that deepest interior part of his being where he has been ordained precisely to lead the people in the sacred action. They are saying in effect, "Be the priest for us now," aware that there is only one priest, Christ Himself, and that this one who represents them now must be finely tuned to perform his sacred duties well'." (A Biblical Walk Through the Mass, p. 28).

The greeting at the start of Mass is a prayer that the Lord will be present with the people and a prayer back from the people acknowledging the spiritual gift God has given to the priest to help lead us in prayer. It is definitely a more formal greeting than we would use out and about. However, what we do at Church is definitely different than meeting each other at a ballgame or a restaurant. The priest may very well go on to give some words of welcome or make a comment on the weather, but those comments follow the opening dialogue: "The Lord be with you," "And with your spirit." Now, let's pray together as God's family!
