

FROM FR. MIKE

This weekend was our annual Parish Social, a chance for us to come together as a Catholic community of faith. After the 4:00 p.m. Mass there was live music, games for the adults and bouncy houses for the kids, a car show, a variety of good food, desserts, and adult beverages as well. I hope you were able to meet some new friends or just had a chance to relax with family and friends. We are blessed to have our parish.

The parish social weekend is a good time to be reminded of the deeper questions of life. What is a parish for? A good working reminder of a parish's purpose is: "To form a community of disciples of Christ." At some point our motive for anything we do here, with the school, RE, ministries, social groups, or events, is to form Catholic disciples of Jesus and encourage one another in faith. This might seem too obvious or basic to some, but as parishes have closed due to lack of involvement, we can reasonably and necessarily remind each other of what life, and the parish is supposed to be about.

The purpose of the parish mergers as part of Renew My Church, as painful as it has been for so many, is to help bring about a real renewal in faith. The Lord desires this for us and even now, in the surveys that we have taken (DMI) people express a desire to have a deeper relationship with Jesus and to become more confident in their faith.

To help meet this need, St. Elizabeth of the Trinity Parish will be offering "The Rescue Project" which seeks to proclaim the Gospel in a compelling and attractive way over eight weeks in a small group format along with a meal. Perhaps we all at times see our faith and good works as a gift back to God, maybe we subtly feel like we're doing Jesus a favor. The greatest work we can do is to receive God, to receive from Jesus Christ the grace, love, and teaching He offers. Can we allow ourselves to be rescued by the Lord?

On the Thursday evenings that these sessions are held this fall, I will be in the church at 6:00 p.m. praying for all those attending by name, that Jesus may touch their hearts in a new way. I encourage anyone that is not directly participating or volunteering in the program to pray in church for a deeper outpouring of the Holy Spirit in the parish and for the needs of the participants. Intercessory prayer is powerful and reminds us that faith is a gift and none of us converts anyone, it is God's work that we all get to be a part of.

The page next to this column shows four questions that will be answered in creative and engaging ways by Fr. John Riccardo who created this ministry. He will also be speaking on September 25th at the Archdiocesan Day of Renewal. He presents Jesus' saving work in very engaging and dramatic ways. Watch the trailer and see for yourself. But most of all, ask the Lord to increase your faith and the faith of those you love.

I remember a colleague at a company I worked for before entering the seminary; he used to ask the question as a boy about life in general: "What does it all mean?" he would ponder. We should not be afraid of the big questions because our hearts desire real answers. God has not left us alone; we were made for times such as these. Come and see.

Parish Survey Findings

OF THE TRIVITY

Key Facts About the Data:

- Importantly, 225 individuals in our parish community filled out the survey. That exceded the target set by the Archdiocese of Chicago.
- However, it's well to note that the profile of the survey respondents was skewed towards females, married persons, and those over age 56. Further, 79% of the respondents were Caucasian and 15% were Hispanic/Latino; 97% were English speaking and 3% Spanish speaking.
- Overall, this means, going forward, we will invite and engage a broad and diverse audience of parishioners to look over and then comment on the responses.
- Another survey facet to underscore isthat it was not constructed as a type of "customer feedback survey" with which we are all familiar. Rather, this parish survey is intended to identify "go forward" areas for the parish as a whole and individual parishioners.


How Can You Help?



Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 8: Penitential Act By FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



After the <u>priest's greeting</u> and people's response at the beginning of the Mass, we next share in the **Penitential Act**. If you think that sounds like penance, don't worry—it's a good thing! During the entrance rite, we recall that we are in the presence of God. If we are truly sincere in realizing that God (who is all-holy) is in our midst, then we recognize the need for purification. We recognize that when we encounter God, we must draw near with a pure heart. So, we take a brief moment of silence to call to mind our sins and failings, and we ask the Lord to forgive and heal us. After our time of silence, the priest (or deacon) leads the community in praying one of three possible prayers (conveniently known as options A, B, and C—more on them next time).

History of the Penitential Act

Like nearly every part of the Holy Sacrifice, we find descriptions of the Penitential Act in early descriptions of the Mass. One of these, the *Didachē* (pronounced: did-uh-kay), meaning *Teaching of the Apostles*, gives instructions for Christians celebrating the Eucharist: "Assemble on the Lord's Day, and break bread and offer the Eucharist; but first make confession of your faults, so that your sacrifice may be a pure one" (*A Biblical Walk Through the Mass*, p. 32). As Father Guy Oury notes, "For a long time in the past this rite concerned only the celebrant and his ministers. Before going up to the altar they remained in silent prayer, lying face to the floor, as is still done in the liturgy of Good Friday" (*The Mass*, p. 49). So that everyone present could be more actively involved in this important part of the Mass, our current options came into use. Besides, except for some of our little ones, it would be really hard for everyone to lie down on the floor inside the pews!

How to Participate

This honest look inside ourselves during the Penitential Act helps us to be aware of our sin and, most importantly, our need for God to help us overcome sin. In a very practical way, this brief reflection recalls the places in our lives where we know we need Christ more. If you haven't yet thought of an intention to join together with the priest's offering of the Mass, this might be a great time to ask specifically for help in overcoming a particular sin or perhaps further healing from the effects of previous sins. We believe that the Mass is our most powerful prayer together because Jesus himself is truly present and we are joining together with Him in the perfect worship of God the Father. In the Mass we take part in the one perfect sacrifice of the Cross where Christ offered Himself so that our sins could be forgiven. Realizing Jesus will be present on the altar or thinking about how the Mass is a sharing in the Cross, this moment can actually be one of great hope. What a great gift!

During this part of the Mass, as you recall your sins, you might feel unworthy of what we are about to celebrate. Although it may be uncomfortable to think about where we need healing and growth, it is actually a good sign of grace at work in our hearts. We are made out of love for love. We are made for life and communion with God and each other. Of course, sin disrupts and breaks that communion: sin moves us away from where we belong. The reason we feel frustrated or embarrassed or sad when we think of our sins is that we know deep inside that sin is contrary to the life to which God calls us. Hopefully, that discomfort will spur us to seek out the forgiveness of Christ through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Sometimes We Use Water Instead

For a little bonus info: Have you ever noticed during this time that the priest might walk around with Holy Water instead? As the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* says, "From time to time on Sundays, especially in Easter Time, instead of the customary Penitential Act, the blessing and sprinkling of water may take place as a reminder of Baptism" (*GIRM*, no. 51). As people from my parishes could tell you, this is often one of my favorite parts of the Mass! Using an aspergillum (typically a small reservoir with a sponge inside on the end of a handle, sometimes referred to as a sprinkler) or perhaps even an evergreen branch, the priest will dip it into the water and then sprinkle the water over the people. As when we talked about using the <u>Holy Water upon entering the church</u>, this water recalls our baptism and the joy of being freed by Christ from sin. No wonder the priest is often so generous with the Holy Water at this part of the Mass!
