FROM FR. MIKE

This weekend we celebrate the Feast of our Patroness, St. Elizabeth of the Trinity, which is officially Wednesday, November 8th. We are grateful that on Saturday Nov. 4 at 4:00 p.m. we will have Fr. Britto Berchman preside at Mass and give a talk on good communication in marriage afterward. All are welcome, but please register beforehand so we can order food accurately. We also have hospitality after the 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. Sunday Masses. Come join us.

An update on our One Parish One Prisoner (OPOP) ministry. Check out the biographies for our two incarcerated friends, Michael and Chris in this bulletin. I hope you have been able to pray for them as they look forward to being released within the next six to twelve months. We all have made mistakes and committed sins, maybe very serious ones, yet we all desire compassion and understanding in the face of our weaknesses. The silence and routine of prison can be a chance for men and women to reflect and pray more, and come to some peace from self-forgiveness while receiving the Lord's love. Everyone has wounds from their past and we may have developed unwholesome ways of coping with them. Please continue to pray for courage and strength for Michael and Chris and support us in helping them release from prison with a future full of hope.

This week also kicks off National Vocation Awareness Week throughout the United States. In his message for the 60th anniversary of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations, Pope Francis stated: "Our common vocation to give ourselves in love develops and finds concrete expression in the life of lay men and women, devoted to raising a family as a small domestic church and working as the leaven of the Gospel to renew the different sectors of society; in the testimony of consecrated women and men who are completely committed to God for the sake of their brothers and sisters as a prophetic sign of the kingdom of God; in ordained ministers – deacons, priests, and bishops – placed at the service of preaching, prayer and fostering the communion of the holy People of God."

The common baptismal call to holiness that we all have is first lived out in the basics of family life, the domestic church. Children learn how to be good Catholic parents by the example that their own parents gave them. Our daily prayer and time for family prayer is so important. The family that prays together stays together is a common saying but is proved to be true from experience. If Christ is truly invoked and made present in our homes, if He is invited, He will bring the peace, guidance, and calm that we need.

Catholic families that practice the faith through regular Sunday Mass, show that the Lord is the priority of the week and of their lives. My own father always told us that while we lived under his roof, we would go to Mass on Sundays because it was a commandment from God and my father led by example. When a family prays, receives the sacraments, and is pursuing the path of ho-

liness it will naturally be a place where a child learns to be open to the particular vocation God has called them to. Jesus Christ calls us all to follow Him in a particular way, many through marriage, some to ordained life as priests, and some to a form of consecrated or intentional single life for His Kingdom.

Have you ever asked a loved one in your life if the Lord was calling them to be a priest or religious?

Christopher Boyd – project release date – Summer, 2024

I'm a good listener and I like to learn. I'm a people person. I want to get a job, buy a house, get married, have a couple of kids, and talk to young men and women about the struggles I've been through, that I made it – talk about the streets, jail, that there are better ways to do stuff. I love a challenge. Meeting new people can be a good thing in my life – especially where I come from. Don't nothing scare me if it's about bettering myself. Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 14: Listening to God's Word by FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



As St. Jerome said, "Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ." Without a doubt, St. Jerome understood that the Bible truly is God speaking to his people. That is why it is so important to have readings from the Bible during Mass. Listening to God's Word helps us to learn about and understand who God is and how much He loves us. Also, we learn about ourselves and just how much we need God in our lives. As we continue some reflections on the Liturgy of the Word, we focus this week on the more spiritual aspects of listening to God's Word and receiving it into our hearts.

Start with Silence

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal reminds us that silence is a very important part of the Mass. Not only are we silent while the readings are read, but there should also be a brief silence after each of the readings. As the Diocese of Peoria's A Study of the Mass teaches, "Even these brief moments allow us to meditate on the marvels and mysteries we just heard... In our world of 'noise,' this silence may seem uncomfortable to us. Yet, this is all the more reason for us to pay close attention to this detail of the sacred Liturgy" (p. 7). Silence is an important means for the faithful to actively participate in the Mass, since it allows the opportunity to really listen with our hearts and take in God's Word.

What if the readings don't make sense to you? Fr. Guy Oury reminds us that "The Word of God is not a document. It is not something of the past that happens to narrate a stage of revelation" (The Mass, p. 62). The Word of God continues to be alive and active (Hebrews 4:12), seeking us out and helping to draw us nearer to God. That is why it is important for us to do our part during the readings of the Mass by really listening and thinking about the words of Scripture. If God is speaking to his people through the Scriptures, and we are part of God's family, then God is saying something to us through each reading. A great question to ask ourselves is: What is God teaching me here? About himself? About us as his people? About how he asks us to live? These reflections will help us concentrate more on the words and help us understand their meaning, even from a reading about a most unusual topic!

Allow His Word to Grow Roots

Another way to help us better understand the readings is to recognize that the entire Old Testament is a preparation of God's people (that includes us!) for receiving Jesus. The New Testament is a fulfillment of the Old—all the prophecies, all the expectations—all perfectly fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. One of my favorite meditations is to think about something from the Old Testament and see how it leads to Jesus. In the same way, then, look at something in the New Testament and remember back to its beginnings in the Old Testament. For example, we read in Isaiah 7:14, "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son and shall call his name Emmanuel." For many of us, our mind probably jumps to Mary and Jesus. Some of the connections are very clear, and some are subtler. Spending time reflecting on the readings can not only help us better understand what we hear, but it also helps the Word of God to be truly rooted in our hearts, our thoughts, and our actions.

As Charles Belmonte reminds us, Sacred Scripture reveals to us the "truth, both about God and about our own salvation... What we hear during the Liturgy of the Word is truth about God and the narrative of the marvels God performed... Its culmination is the Paschal Mystery of the Death and Resurrection of Christ, which is perpetuated in the Eucharist. Therefore, the central theme of the readings is always Christ... By carefully listening to the Word of God and reflecting on it, we will realize who ... Christ is, what he says and does, what he expects of us, and how we are to go about accomplishing the task he entrusted to us. Gradually, we will enter into the intimacy of God and discover the meaning of our own existence. And, as a consequence, we will get to know how to do—always and in everything—the will of God" (Understanding the Mass, p. 75-76). Now that's a reason to "listen up!"

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
