


DECEMBER 10, 2023





On this Second Sunday of Advent, we prepare for Christ's first coming in the beginning of the Gospel of Mark that says: "The beginning of the gospel (good news) of Jesus Christ the Son of God." The good news is presented by the wild figure of John the Baptist calling people to repent of their sins so that they could be prepared for the coming of the One long foretold.

John baptized in the Jordan River which was the place where the exodus ended about 1,400 years earlier. When the Chosen people's forty years of purifying in the desert was over, they crossed the river dry shod into the Promised Land and the manna eased as they ate from the fruit of the land. God had been faithful to His covenant, but the people often were not.

Throughout the history of salvation, we see a pattern: suffering and trial are often the only way people can appreciate the Lord's blessings and grace. The Israelites grumbled and often wanted to go back to the flesh pots of Egypt and so needed purifying in the desert to cling to the Lord. When they became too comfortable in Israel, they broke the covenant with God repeatedly including through idolatry, human sacrifice, and many injustices. God sent prophets to warn them until He allowed the Temple to be destroyed and imposed a seventy-year exile in Babylon.

The first reading from Isaiah shows how God comforted the people after the exile. And at the time of John the Baptist's coming the people were suffering again under Roman occupation, but they came out in throngs to seek forgiveness and so prepare themselves for the Lord's coming. We sometimes need "rock bottom" moments as a people, a Church, or individually to wake us up to our need of God's grace.

Not long ago I heard a quote that struck me as applying to the ups and downs of salvation history and our own times: "Hard times create strong men, strong men create good times, good times create weak men, and weak men create hard times." This quote is from a postapocalyptic novel by the author G. Michael Hopf although I haven't read it. While the language is not inclusive of women or children it can be for John the Baptist's spiritual point today. Our times have become hard and so let us go back to the beginning of the Gospel, the good news.

It is admittedly a hard thing to be honest that we are sinners in need of a Savior, it takes a strong person to admit when one is weak. The times have become hard in part because we as Catholics, have become too weak to confess our sins. We should not repent because we want a cushy more comfortable life as a nation or a Church but because we need to for the good of our own souls. The world will become better when we become better.

If it has been a long time since you have made a good confession, try not to be afraid, the Lord loves us and wants us to trust him. There is a good examination of conscience on our website, under the Sacramental information tab, that includes how to go to the sacrament, the Act of Contrition, and the Ten Commandments with other questions to help us reflect honestly about our sins and then trusting in Jesus' mercy in the sacrament He gave us to forgive such sins. Repentance/metanoia is a necessary part of the good news of Jesus.

A voice of one crying out in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."

The day started with a presentation showing how our student daily lives differ from Rwandan students. Later in the day, the older students asked questions that have been sent to the Station School students for responses. Our younger students wrote letters and are awaiting responses as well. Our students are also raising money to sponsor new students at the Station School and are interested in learning more about the well project currently under construction.

Many of you have asked how the well project is going. The pipe is in place, and we should have water flowing to the Station School within the next few weeks. We are still in need of \$10,000 to complete the project.

Here is an interesting fact; we just realized one of the students front and center in our photo at the start of the project is now a scholarship winner and will be attending the University of Rwanda in January. We really do make a difference in the world!

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 18: Response After Readings By FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



"The Word of the Lord."
"Thanks be to God!"

After the First and Second Readings at Mass, we have this familiar statement and response from the congregation. As the Diocese of Peoria's *A Study of the Mass* teaches, "At the end of the reading, the lector announces, 'the Word of the Lord,' which is a testament of our faith in the inspired Word of God in Sacred Scripture. We readily show our gratitude and respond, 'Thanks be to God!' We are thankful that God has revealed himself to us and that He continues to speak to us" (p. 7).

God Speaks to Us

Far more than just being "standard operating procedure," these little dialogues are really powerful affirmations of what is happening during the Liturgy of the Word. While the lector proclaims God's Word, we listen to what God wants to teach us that particular day. Even if we are generally attentive to the readings, we can easily get distracted. Perhaps we notice someone sitting nearby and think of a question we wanted to ask him or her. Sometimes, a word in the reading reminds us of another thought. Maybe our stomach growls and we start thinking about what our next meal might be. In any event, at the end of the reading, the lector helps to get us back on track if we've wandered astray. The lector says, "The Word of the Lord," as if to say, "In case you forgot or didn't notice, the Lord God of heaven and earth was just speaking to you." It really is amazing to stop and think about: God is speaking to us, his people, through the readings at Mass!

Our response, "Thanks be to God," acknowledges that God is truly speaking to his people through the Bible reading we just heard and that we recognize we are blessed to hear those words! Being in the habit of turning to God in thankfulness can be so helpful in our daily living as well. In the midst of our lives, we easily get our hearts turned inward, such as when we are thinking about what makes us happy or what we would enjoy for dinner. In more serious situations, when we fall into sin, we are turned inward in a way that keeps our vision away from God and others. When this happens, we can find ourselves falling into selfishness and self-seeking behavior. We can also miss opportunities for charity because we do not recognize the good in the people around us.

Practicing Thankfulness

In these latter situations, the grace of the sacraments helps strengthen us. Thankfulness is also a great remedy that helps turn our hearts as we recognize blessings that have come from God and others. Being thankful can give us a reset and help us once again to see and appreciate the gifts God has given us and the good that we can see in one another. We glimpse the wisdom behind our response to the readings at Mass. Being in the habit of regularly thanking God helps keep our hearts healthy and on track.

Not only does this dialogue help us acknowledge God and thank him for the Scriptures, but it can also help us stay in tune with what we are doing at Mass. As you may know, the word Eucharist itself means "thanksgiving." In the Mass, we join with Christ in the perfect sacrifice of praise to God the Father. As God's people, we are also joined together in thankful praise, recognizing the love of Christ and our invitation to share in that love. Very fittingly, after the Second Reading and response, we will praise God together in preparation for the Gospel as we sing the Alleluia!


