FROM FR. MIKE

This weekend is the in-pew solicitation for the Archdiocesan Annual Catholic Appeal. This annual fundraising campaign supports the parishes, schools, ministries, programs, and agencies that serve the educational, physical, and spiritual needs of the people of the Archdiocese of Chicago. Concretely, your gracious donation finances ministries like: the Kolbe House Jail Ministry, Office for Divine Worship, Respect Life/Pro Life Office, Office of Lifelong Formation, Catholic Relief Services, etc.

This collection also supports our chaplain ministries at local universities: the Calvert House at the University of Chicago, the Shiel Center at Northwestern, and the St. John Paul II Newman Center at UIC. Other important ministries include SPRED, Catholic Office of the Deaf and many more. Many of you have been generous donors to the ACA in the past and we ask that you continue. As you may know, once our pledge goal is reached, any extra money comes back to the parish as a rebate for our own parish needs. Our goal this year is about \$44,000 which we exceeded last year and hope to do so again this year. May the Lord bless you for your generosity.

You may have noticed a new staff person in the rectory office. Alex Mucerino is our new Administrative Assistant. Kathy O'Sullivan who worked in the office at St. Cornelius and here at St. Elizabeth of the Trinity retired over the holidays but is still involved in the Women's Group. She will now be getting some much-deserved rest. Kathy O. was a hub of information, and she took time and had concern for all of you. If you haven't had a chance yet to thank Kathy for her years of faithful service, you can leave a note at the rectory if you don't catch her at Mass and we will forward it to her. You can read Alex Mucerino's bio in this bulletin and don't worry, she has Kathy O's number for any questions she may have. Kathy is a good mentor.

I recently received a letter from Fr. David Grenier, OFM, the Commissariat of the Holy Land. We are all pretty aware of the tragic plight of the attacked Israelis and innocent victims in Gaza, but we may not be aware of the Christians struggling in the Holy Land and the Franciscans who minister there and watch over the sacred shrines. As Fr. Grenier says: *"Hope is much needed at the moment for the Christians in the Holy Land."* Now, as during Covid, their income is gone since *"Most of our faithful rely on the pilgrimage industry to make a living."* The war in that region has ended travel there.

Christians now in the Holy Land have no recourse but to rely on other's help; *"People need support for everything, including medicine, surgeries, food, and school tuition. Fear and despair are very strong."* Pope Francis has asked that all Catholics at the parish level take up a collection on Good Friday to support the Christians and the Franciscans there...they need us now more than ever. Lent is just around the corner so it is the perfect time to begin to plan how our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving can be used as effectively as possible both at home and abroad. 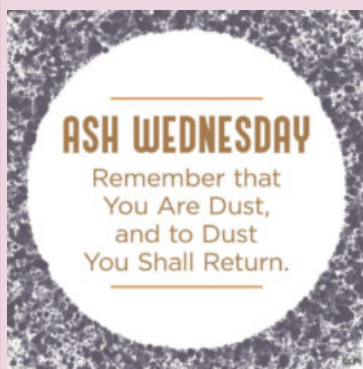

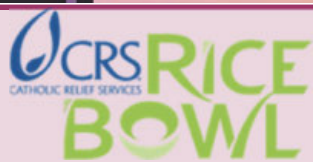


LENTEN DISCIPLINES OF FASTING & ABSTINENCE

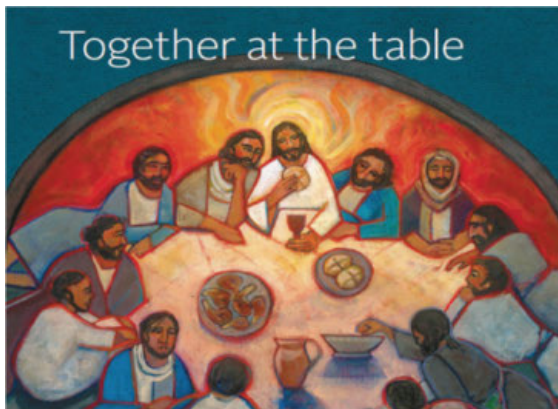
Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

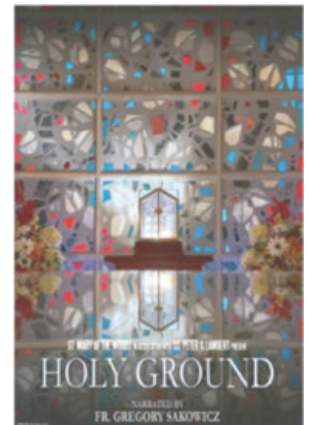

HOLY GROUND

Narrated by Fr. Gregory Sakowicz, Holy Ground stars Susan L. “Where westward migration took place, the Catholic Church was not far behind,” narrates Fr. Greg Sakowicz in *Holy Ground*. The documentary reflects on Chicago’s emergence as one of the largest cities in the world—a feat mirrored in the expansion of the Catholics. Holy Ground covers a vast history that includes explorers’ discovery of the Chicago Portage, John Kinzie, Billy Caldwell (aka Chief Sauganash), The Battle of Fort Dearborn, Chief Tecumseh, The Treaty of Chicago, the fur trade, the 1893 World’s Fair, architects Burnham & Root, art deco, glass artists Gabriel Loire & Max Ingrand, the railroads, The Great Chicago Fire, German influences, and the establishment of various Catholic churches throughout Chicago’s north side. By revisiting this wide berth of history, *Holy Ground* shows how the expansion of the Catholic Church directly correlated to Chicago’s own rapid growth from the 1830s through mid-century.

NATIONAL Eucharistic Revival

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 27: The Creed By FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



“I believe in one God...” We all likely recognize these words as the beginning of the **Creed** which we say together after the homily. Besides needing to stand up and stretch our legs after the homily, why do we have the **Creed**?

What is the Creed?

According to the glossary of our *Catechism*, a creed is “a brief, normative summary statement or profession of Christian faith, e.g., the Apostles’ Creed, the Nicene Creed. The word ‘Creed’ comes from the Latin *Credo*, meaning ‘I believe,’ with which the Creed begins” (CCC, Glossary, s.v. “Creed”). As we will see, a creed is a collection of core truths in which we believe. As the *Catechism* teaches, there have been many professions of faith that have come from Church Councils or from certain individuals. “None of the creeds from the different stages in the Church’s life can be considered superseded or irrelevant. They help us today to attain and deepen the faith of all times by means of the different summaries made of it” (CCC, no. 193).

The *Catechism* continues that two creeds have a special place in the Church’s life: the Apostles’ Creed and the Nicene Creed. “The Apostles’ Creed is so called because it is rightly considered to be a faithful summary of the apostles’ faith” (CCC, no. 194). “The Niceno-Constantinopolitan or Nicene Creed draws its great authority from the fact that it stems from the first two ecumenical Councils (in 325 and 381). It remains common to all the great Churches of both East and West to this day” (CCC, no. 195). Although either the Apostles’ Creed or the Nicene Creed can be used in the Mass, many of us probably most often hear the Nicene Creed being used.

A Statement of Faith and Renewal of Belief

How did the Creed enter the Mass? As the Diocese of Peoria instructs, “The Creed, or Profession of Faith, stems from the Ancient Church. This statement of belief was not originally written to be recited at Mass; it was rather intended as a prerequisite ‘contract’ for adult baptism. One would profess these essential truths of the faith before being admitted into the Church through baptism. Eventually, the Creed would be inserted into the Mass as it is today” (*A Study of the Mass*, p. 9). Fr. Guy Oury says, “The Fathers of the Church recommended that Christians recite [the Creed] daily, morning and evening, as a renewal of their faith and safeguard against doctrinal error” (*The Mass*, p. 71). How many of you say the Creed when you get out of bed each morning?! Jokes aside, the Fathers of the Church were really on to something here. Because the Creed is a great summary of the truths of the Faith, especially the Holy Trinity (more on that to come), knowing the Creed is a wonderful way to know some of the basics of the faith and to keep them fresh in our minds and hearts.

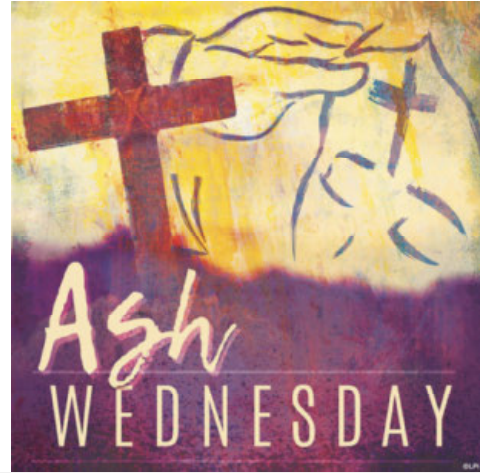
