

Excerpts from the Lectionary for Mass ©2001, 1998, 1970 CCD.



Next week we look forward to our Lenten mission speaker, Fr. Tim Anastos. You might know Fr. Anastos from his time as the Associate Pastor at Mary Seat of Wisdom. He is currently on assignment at the UIC St. John Paul II Newman Center doing very good work there as a chaplain. I had the benefit of recently completing the spiritual direction training program with him, he is a faithful and engaging priest. Fr. Tim will speak about encountering Jesus Christ more deeply in the Eucharist and in the quiet of Adoration. Come join us if you can on Monday, March 4th, 7:00 p.m. in the Auditorium. Hors d'oeuvres will be served.

Please read the letter from Dr. Hillmann in this bulletin on our goal to raise money for financial aid to qualifying families for our school, the Trinity Tuition Assistance Fund (TTAF). We had about 20 students per year qualify for the former Illinois Tax Credit Scholarship, with a total of about \$125,000 of annual need. We are looking at finding a couple of larger donors who would be able to offer matching gifts to help incentivize others for this annual collection. We currently have raised over \$25,000 for next year already. Thank you for your generosity in supporting Catholic education for those that need some help.

Now to the 2nd Sunday of Lent, "*He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified*" (Mk. 9:6). This was how Peter told St. Mark he reacted to witnessing Jesus being Transfigured before them after he offered to be a tent builder. Jesus was revealed in His Divine glory, shown talking with Moses and Elijah and fulfilling God's promises, but Peter felt compelled to speak and not take it all in, presuming the good Lord would reveal more. Perhaps Peter wanted to say something to dim the mystery before him, to domesticate and bring it down to earth.

Had Peter waited he would have heard the Father speak from the cloud "This is My beloved Son in whom I am well pleased, listen to Him." Jesus Himself was to explain further what this sign meant and that they would understand more after He had risen form the dead. We are an impatient lot we humans, and we often feel the need to speak when listening would be better for us. Part of the discipline of Lent, is trying to discipline our senses, including our speech so that we can try to prioritize not just listening to others, but hearing the voice of the Lord guiding us in our daily lives.

One benefit of not talking as much as we tend to is that we might appear less foolish, as Peter did, as the saying goes "Better to remain silent and be thought a fool than to speak and to remove all doubt." But we ought not to care too much what others think of us, especially if there is a need to speak a necessary but uncomfortable truth. Wise people are not always silent, but they know when to be.

St. Alphonsus Ligouri has powerful reflections on the importance of the practice of silene: "It is hard to find a truly holy person who talks much. But they who have the spirit of prayer love silence, which has deservedly been called a guardian of innocence, a shield against temptations and a fruitful source of prayer. Silence promotes recollection and awakens good thoughts in the heart."

People often try to fill the quiet time in their life with noise and distraction, perhaps out of fear of being or feeling alone. But we are not alone.

Be still before the LORD; wait for Him" (Ps. 37:7).

Our Lenten Journey Has Begun!

Occasionally, Lent begins on Valentine's Day, as it did this year. So, this Ash Wednesday, we skipped the exchange of chocolates and focused on the message of Love. What better way to begin the Lenten journey of preparing our hearts for Jesus! Contemplating the three pillars of Lent, the R.E. students made resolutions to pray, make sacrifices, and do "40 days of Kindness". Second Graders learned to pray for others using the seven words that St. Elizabeth of the Trinity often used. Whenever Elizabeth was asked for prayers, she would petition Christ using the words that Martha and Mary, the beloved sisters of Lazarus, used when they sought help: "Lord, the one you love is sick...". The students wrote their prayers in the same manner and put them at the foot of the Cross. RCIC students took home Lenten Resolution Trackers and magnets to prominently post their trackers on the refrigerator as a daily reminder. Our parish community joined in prayer and fellowship for the Ashes & Pizza event. We were pleased to welcome over 150 guests! (Next year, we will order more pizzas!!) Speaking of prayers, our Confirmation students attended the 9:00 a.m. Mass last Sunday and received a special blessing. As Fr. McCarthy proclaimed: "These students are the future of the Church." Dear Parents, Parishioners and Friends of St. Elizabeth,

St. Elizabeth of the Trinity officially opened its doors, amid a pandemic, to students in the fall of 2020, after merging with St. Thecla and Pope Francis Global Academy - North Campus. Since then, we have remained open, offering in-person education for all our students, when other schools did not. We are very fortunate that new families joined St. Elizabeth during these past few years, because we remained open - and provided a Catholic education to all students.

In 2017, Illinois created the Invest in Kids Act, which allowed students to attend a private school with partial or full tuition covered, if they reside in a failing public school district as well as showed financial need. This program, also known as the Tax Credit Scholarship Program, awarded about 14% of our student population the funds to attend St Elizabeth, in the amount of around \$125K. Unfortunately, the Illinois legislature did not renew this program which leaves many families unsure of how they will afford private education. Schools are working tirelessly to work out a budget that will allow their students to remain in school.

I write to all of you today to ask for your financial support to help keep these students at St. Elizabeth. The boards of St. Elizabeth of the Trinity created the Trinity Tuition Assistance Fund, to help cover the costs of tuition for families in need. The tuition for one child per year is \$6840. I am asking for you to give what you can, whether it be \$500 or \$5000! Every little bit helps to ensure these 25 students remain at St. Elizabeth of the Trinity for years to come. And, I hope to continue to grow our Trinity Tuition Assistance Fund, so that anyone who wants to be a part of St. Elizabeth in the future, is able, no matter their financial situation.

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 29: The Creed as Statement of Faith in the Trinity by FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



Having considered the Creed in general, let's take a closer look at the contents of this statement of our Faith. As we look through the phrases, the Creed is very clearly laying out the main truths about the Holy Trinity, our belief in One God in Three Persons. As our current *Catechism* quotes from the *Roman Catechism* (or the *Catechism of the Council of Trent*), explaining "The Creed is divided into three parts: 'the first part speaks of the first divine Person and the wonderful work of creation; the next speaks of the second divine Person and the mystery of his redemption of men; the final part speaks of the third divine Person, the origin and source of our sanctification" (*CCC*, no. 190).

The Three Parts of the Creed

Charles Belmonte expands this introduction to the three parts of the Creed:

- A confession of faith in God, the Father, our Creator, maker of heaven and earth, of all [things visible and invisible].
- A confession of faith in Christ, our Lord. He is God, who by the power of the Spirit became incarnate [of] the Virgin Mary and was made man. Then we focus on Christ's Passion and Death on the Cross; his Resurrection, Ascension, and participation in the judgment to reign forever, as it was announced by the angel to the Virgin Mary (Lk. 1:33).
- A confession of faith in the means of salvation, supplied by God, the Holy Spirit, the giver of supernatural life. We declare how he works through the Church (Understanding the Mass, p. 100-101). Continuing through the last part of the Creed, Belmonte writes, "[I] believe in one holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. [The word] catholic means 'universal'—a reminder that the Church exists throughout the world and embraces the entire revelation of God... The Church is apostolic because she traces her origins back to Christ through the apostles and always teaches the message the apostles received from him" (Understanding the Mass, p. 101). The Church is one and holy because it is founded by Christ and led by the Holy Spirit toward the unity and holiness that Jesus calls all Christians to live.

We call this list the Four Marks of the Church. These characteristics are like landmarks or distinguishing features that help us to know the one true Church of Jesus.

Words to Speak... and Believe

As we go through each phrase, we are reviewing the truths we believe in, and we are also invited into a reflection on the ways that God has made himself known to us. We recall the steps of salvation history and the moment when God dwells among us. We remember the ultimate gift of God's love and the gift of the Holy Spirit who helps unite us and strengthen us for life in that love. As Belmonte concludes:

"The Creed is none other than the marvelous history of God's love for us... In these times of doctrinal confusion, we should be careful not to compromise the content of our faith, not even in small things... It is worthwhile, above all, to decide to take our Christian life seriously. When we recite the Creed, we state that we believe in God the Father Almighty, in his Son, Jesus Christ, who died and rose again, and in the Holy Spirit, the Lord and giver of life. We affirm that the Church—one, holy, catholic, and apostolic—is the body of Christ enlivened by the Holy Spirit. We rejoice in the forgiveness of sins and in the hope of the resurrection. But do those words penetrate to the depths of our own heart? Or do they remain only on our lips?" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 102).

We say the Creed often, and many of us can likely follow along without even really thinking about the words. But wouldn't it be fruitful to truly ask ourselves what we are saying? What truths are we proclaiming together? What do we mean when we say those words?


