Next weekend is the Solemnity of Corpus Christi and we have something special planned. First, there will be no 1:00 p.m. Spanish Mass on Sunday, June 2nd because the 11:00 a.m. Mass will be a bilingual Mass followed by a Eucharistic procession from Ardmore to Moody, to Milwaukee and then back to church for the Rite of Benediction. There will be music sung all along the procession route. The Spanish Legion of Mary group will create an altar in the Moody parking lot so we can have one formal stop on the procession route to honor the Lord with prayers and incensing. Fr. Leo also found a nice canopy that we can use this year and all the clergy with be involved.

After the procession and Benediction in church, there will be a lunch in the Auditorium that will start at about 12:40 p.m. A special thanks to the Spanish Mass hospitality team and Ashley Guinn for coordinating the food, and the Women's Group for focusing on the desserts. Come and honor Jesus on this special day and meet a new parishioner or two over some Mexican food at lunch! Jesus gave this sacrament of love to us, and we are glad to witness to the Lord in the world.

The following day after Corpus Christi, June 3rd, is our 8th grade graduation during a 6:00 p.m. Mass in church. These children have been on quite a journey together with the ups and downs of Covid and having gone through school transitions as well. But the results are impressive. Of the 11 graduates, one is going to Walter Payton College Prep, two are going to the Taft International Baccalaureate program, four to Notre Dame, two to Regina Dominican, one to Holy Trinity and one is moving out of state. Most of the graduates are receiving academic scholarships. It is also worth noting that seven of these 8th graders are altar servers and some may continue through high school with that ministry. For many reasons, SET school is something to be proud of.

But all of that is next week. This week is the day the Church celebrates the most central Mystery of Faith, from which all good things flow. In the order of truths, the central and most important truth is about who God is in Himself. This is Trinity Sunday, when we remember that there is one God in three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

God is worthy of being loved based on who God is, not just what the Lord has done for us, which is amazing. God has created everything out of nothing, all life is such a miracle and gift building up to human beings who are made in God's image and likeness. And when we wandered through sin, Jesus, the Son came to rescue us. The Holy Spirit of love, encouragement, and strength has been given to help us on this pilgrim journey. Yet ultimately, God is love in Himself, beyond what He has done for us and desires that we love Him in return for His own goodness.

In the end, we want to be loved for who we are, not just for what we do. We may feel we have to prove our goodwill and our worth, but we would like to be treasured for our own sakes and not because we are productive. Love can't be earned, it is freely given and received. The one God is a relationship of love, He takes delight in us for our own sakes and wants us to delight in Him.


All are invited to participate in a discussion of <u>The</u> <u>Screwtape Letters</u> by C.S. Lewis.

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 42, The Eucharistic Prayer by FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



After the Prayer over the Offerings, we now come to the **Eucharistic Prayer**. According to the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, "Now the center and high point of the entire celebration begins, namely, the Eucharistic Prayer itself, that is, the prayer of thanksgiving and sanctification. The priest calls upon the people to lift up their hearts to the Lord in prayer and thanksgiving; he associates the people with himself in the Prayer that he addresses in the name of the entire community to God the Father through Jesus Christ in the Holy Spirit. Furthermore, the meaning of this Prayer is that the whole congregation of the faithful joins with Christ in confessing the great deeds of God and in the offering of Sacrifice. The Eucharistic Prayer requires that everybody listens to it with reverence and in silence" (GIRM, 78).

Here we go! For those longing for the true presence of Jesus, the time is drawing near! For those who yearn to pray well, we are invited to participate in the perfect prayer of Jesus—his perfect sacrifice and worship of the Father. Throughout the Eucharistic Prayer, we can find a great outline and model for our own prayer. By taking a closer look at the main components, we can hopefully enter more fruitfully into this wonderful prayer.

The Elements of the Eucharistic Prayer

As the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* continues, "The main elements of which the Eucharistic Prayer consists may be distinguished from one another in this way:

a) The *thanksgiving* (expressed especially in the Preface), in which the priest, in the name of the whole of the holy people, glorifies God the Father and gives thanks to him for the whole work of salvation or for some particular aspect of it, according to the varying day, festivity, or time of year.

b) The *acclamation*, by which the whole congregation, joining with the heavenly powers, sings the *Sanctus* (Holy, Holy, Holy). This acclamation, which constitutes part of the Eucharistic Prayer itself, is pronounced by all the people with the priest.

c) The *epiclesis*, in which, by means of particular invocations, the Church implores the power of the Holy Spirit that the gifts offered by human hands be consecrated, that is, become Christ's Body and Blood, and that the unblemished sacrificial Victim to be consumed in Communion may be for the salvation of those who will partake of it.

d) The *institution narrative and Consecration*, by which, by means of the words and actions of Christ, that Sacrifice is effected which Christ himself instituted during the Last Supper, when he offered his Body and Blood under the species of bread and wine, gave them to the Apostles to eat and drink, and leaving with the latter the command to perpetuate this same mystery.

e) The *anamnesis*, by which the Church, fulfilling the command that she received from Christ the Lord through the apostles, celebrates the memorial of Christ, recalling especially his blessed Passion, glorious Resurrection and Ascension into heaven.

f) The *oblation*, by which, in this very memorial, the Church, in particular that gathered here and now, offers the unblemished sacrificial Victim in the Holy Spirit to the Father. The Church's intention, indeed, is that the faithful not only offer this unblemished sacrificial Victim but also learn to offer their very selves, and so day by day to be brought, through the mediation of Christ, into unity with God and with each other, so that God may at last be all in all.

g) The *intercessions*, by which expression is given to the fact that the Eucharist is celebrated in communion with the whole Church, of both heaven and of earth, and that the oblation is made for her and for all her members, living and dead, who are called to participate in the redemption and salvation purchased by the Body and Blood of Christ.

h) The concluding *Doxology*, by which the glorification of God is expressed and which is affirmed and concluded by the people's acclamation, *Amen*" (*GIRM*, 79; emphases added).

In the weeks ahead, we'll be taking a closer look at the Eucharistic Prayers and these individual parts. Is anyone wondering how much longer before Holy Communion? The wait will definitely be worthwhile!
