

Jesus said to them, "Amen, amen, I say to you, it was not Moses who gave the bread from heaven; my Father gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." - Jn 6:32-33



The Foundation of Your Belief

We are blessed to be in the midst of five Sundays that boldly focus on the source and summit of our faith, the Eucharist. The Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time presents the second lectionary passage from John's chapter six (John 6:24-35). Toward the end, Jesus proclaims, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." For many future believers who were present there and for Jesus' Apostles, this proclamation became the foundation of their deep trust that Christ remained present in the world, even after the Ascension. It became the foundation of their belief that in the celebration of the Eucharist, in those early breaking-of-the-bread moments at the table, the same Jesus they saw with their own eyes was indeed present in their midst. For those first Christians, passing and partaking of bread after the blessing of thanksgiving—perhaps by one of the Apostles—became a source of consolation and much-needed fervor to continue their evangelizing mission.

For us, one question worth asking is: what is the foundation of my belief in the Eucharist? What is the one moment, phrase, word, or person that sealed your trust that Jesus is truly present in the consecrated Host and Wine? As a kid, before making my First Communion, I was curious about the Host my parents had the opportunity to receive every time we went to Mass. I saw that action of receiving Communion as a privilege that I did not yet have. Time and again, I tried to understand how Jesus could be in that tiny piece of bread. Did Jesus come down from Heaven and enter the Host? Was the Host His house? These were questions that, as a child, kept coming to mind. I truly wanted to know how Christ did it: how the Son of God, in His infinite love for us, dwelled in the bread given to the faithful at Mass.


It was not until I was studying to make my First Communion that it finally "clicked." I

learned that even if our eyes cannot see Him, Christ is truly present in the Eucharist because He said He would be. That is, Jesus not only promised, but He also boldly assured us that He is the Bread from heaven given by God the Father and that He would remain in the world "until the end of the age." That was a blessed moment. As an eight-year-old, I knew Christ was present in the Host like I knew I was alive!

During this time of Eucharistic Revival, let us continue to remember those moments—perhaps from our childhood—that emboldened our faith in the presence of Jesus on the altar. He is there. His presence in our midst is the direct work of God's love!



Are you of High School age or older and missing Baptism, First Communion, or Confirmation? Do you desire to be in full Communion with the Catholic Church? The Lord awaits all of us to answer His call to a deeper relationship with Him through His Church. This is only possible if we have the Sacraments that He gave His Church. We welcome all who desire to be in full communion with the Catholic Church to attend OCIA, formerly known as RCIA.


What is OCIA (RCIA)? The Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA) is a process for adults who wish to enter the Catholic Church or complete their Sacraments of initiation and is designed for the following:

- 1) those who have never been baptized
- 2) those who have been baptized in another Christian faith
- 3) those who have been baptized Catholic but never prepared for and received First Communion and/or Confirmation.

The OCIA sessions, hosted by our sister parish St. Paul of the Cross, also provide opportunities for you to ask the questions you may have about the Catholic Church. You will be able to learn what the Catholic Church believes, teaches, and proclaims as revealed by God.

SEOT Parishioners Joined 50,000+ Catholics in Indianapolis for the National Eucharistic Congress



Mary Beirne, Margaret Beirne, Peggy Bradley, Tim and Jane O'Leary, Gilda Rivero, and the Sager family attended the National Eucharistic Congress held July 17 – 21, 2024. Five days of Eucharistic worship, praying the Rosary Across America with Fr. Rocky, morning Mass, nightly praise and worship revival events, breakout sessions with inspirational Catholic speakers, and a Eucharistic Procession through

downtown, culminated in the closing liturgy on Sunday celebrated by Cardinal Luis Tagle, the

special envoy from Pope Francis.

Tim O'Leary shared: "Jane and I were blessed to be with so many faithful Catholics who love the Lord. It was a powerful experience to be with over 50,000 people in a stadium adoring Jesus in silence. Bishop Andrew Cozzens prayed in humility, thanking God for blessing all the work of the last two years. The last Congress was held in 1941, but this was the first ever to include all 50 states in

the planning --- a huge moment in our Faith. We gave it five stars - a truly historic moment."

Mary Beirne, who attended with her sister, Margaret, summed up their experience, saying,

"What an extraordinary experience! Seeing so many young priests and nuns

and all the families was wonderful. "Hope" was the word we kept hearing.

The Catholic Church is alive and well!"

The Sager family participated in the sessions geared for families.

In response to Cardinal Tagle's commissioning of the assembly to be part of a new era of Eucharistic

Mission, to "take the gift we have received and go out to be a gift to the world!", Gilda Rivero shared her prayer: "Keep Your Spirit ablaze in me,


O Jesus, that I may stay on course and continue the work that was started through this Eucharistic Revival."

Step-by-Step Walk Through the Mass Do This in Remembrance of Me, Part 52, Anamnesis by FR. LUKE SPANNAGEL



Blessings to you all! As we continue through the Mass, here comes another big word: **Anamnesis** (commonly pronounced: Ann-amm-nee-siss), also known as the **Memorial Acclamation**. Now that Jesus is truly present on the altar and we have adored him quietly, what else should we do but raise our voices and proclaim our joy out loud? After the elevation of the chalice, the priest genuflects in adoration. When he rises, he says, "The mystery of faith." These words invite one of three responses: "We proclaim your Death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection until you come again"; or "When we eat this Bread and drink this Cup, we proclaim your Death, O Lord, until you come again"; or "Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free."

A Charles Belmonte writes, "The Anamnesis is a prayer of remembrance in which the Church calls to mind the Lord's passion, resurrection, and ascension into heaven... We have just been asked to 'proclaim the mystery of faith.' And what is this mystery? Precisely the redeeming sacrifice of Christ celebrated in these rites" (*Understanding the Mass*, p. 145).

Christ's Sacrifice: A Past Event Made Present

The Diocese of Peoria points out, "As the Second Vatican Council teaches, the Mass perpetuates the Sacrifice of the Cross throughout the ages until Jesus Christ comes again in glory. The Mystery of Faith announces three main points: past, present, future. It recalls the event of the Cross [We proclaim your Death, O Lord], a present reality [and profess your Resurrection] and a future anticipation [until you come again]. The redemptive sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross is of infinite and eternal value. Therefore, redemption isn't an historical event—it is a present reality! At the celebration of the Mass, then, the Cross is remembered in such a way that it is rendered present. We are not spectators of a theatrical reenactment, but of a sacramental re-presentation" ("A Study of the Mass," pp. 15–16).

This teaching highlights for us that having Christ truly present in the Mass really stretches us beyond our limits of space and time. At a point in history, we know that Jesus carried the Cross and offered himself in sacrifice for the forgiveness of our sins. Yet, the Mass allows us to touch that offering, not just as something that happened in the past but as truly present—the one perfect sacrifice of Jesus there before us.

A Memorial That Leads Us into the Mystery

Continuing with the Diocese of Peoria, "How does this happen? On the altar of the Cross, Jesus Christ offered himself to the Father 'for you and for [many for the forgiveness of sins].' At the Last Supper, when Jesus instituted the way in which we would celebrate this redemptive sacrifice, he said, 'Do this in memory of me.' The anamnesis (memorial) of the Eucharistic prayer calls to mind the Paschal Mystery—the passion, death, resurrection, and ascension of the Lord. As the catechism teaches, 'the memorial is not merely the recollection of past events but the proclamation of the mighty works wrought by God' (*CCC* 1363). Thus, the sacred events are made present and real at the Mass. As the Paschal Mystery is made present to the Father, the Church, through the Holy Spirit, is united with Christ in his perfect sacrificial offering" ("A Study of the Mass," p. 16).

Perhaps this helps us more clearly understand what we mean when we say "Memorial." The Biblical understanding of memorial is much more than remembering. For us, we might look at an old photo album and recall from the pictures the joy of a certain day. The beauty of the Mass as sacrificial memorial is that it brings us into that certain day. This reality leads us into the meaning of "Mystery."

Mystery: An Invitation to Grow Deeper

I think the word *mystery* is one we don't always fully grasp. Through the years, I have heard people say, "It is a mystery," as a reason to leave one of our teachings at a distance. Maybe for them, saying a certain truth is a mystery is a way of saying, "This is beyond my understanding, so I'm not going to worry about it." Certainly, one meaning of the word *mystery* is that something is difficult to explain or understand. But from our faith perspective, it really is an invitation to grow deeper. We know that God is infinite and we are not. We know that the truths of God can sometimes feel beyond our daily lived observation and experience. We also know that God has revealed himself to us in love and that Jesus has given himself in sacrifice out of love. The Mystery of Faith really invites us to meditate with joy on the realization that God loves us and brings many truths and realities together at once to show the abundant generosity of that love.

A quote from Mother Teresa might help us meditate on how the Last Supper, the Cross, and the Mass are together the one perfect and loving sacrifice of Jesus: "If Jesus had not established the Eucharist we would have forgotten the crucifixion. It would have faded into the past and we would have forgotten that Jesus loved us. There is a saying that to be far away from the eyes is to be far away from the heart. To make sure that we do not forget, Jesus gave us the Eucharist as a memorial of His love... When you look at the Crucifix, you understand how much Jesus loved you then; when you look at the Sacred Host, you understand how much Jesus loves you now."
