

--- Just a quick transition update before the most important good news of all. Fr. Deo, the new priest for St. Elizabeth of the Trinity Parish, will start officially on-site June 1st as the associate pastor before starting on July 1st as my replacement. Fr. Deo will continue as the administrator at his current assignment, Blessed Sacrament Parish, until May 31st. For those wondering, I was told to still take my planned sabbatical on July 1st and will start on-site at Our Lady of Ransom when I return from that, even though I will officially be assigned as pastor there on July 1st. More to come.

--- The real good news for today is something we have all heard about but perhaps take for granted a bit. I remember some years ago watching a mafia themed movie or tv show and one of the regular characters, a larger man who clearly liked to eat had lost his wife to cancer and he was really shaken by her death. Many people came to visit and comfort him and brought him his favorite pastas and other dishes, especially since his wife was no longer there to help take care of him. They offered him their condolences as best they could and gave him comfort food but after a while of this he said with some frustration: "*Not every problem can be solved with food.*"

Wakes and funerals are a time when our human desire to show love to others comes up against the absolute powerlessness we have over the situation, and insufficiency of our kindness to solve the person's problem. We go to pay our respects and offer to do whatever we can for them and the grieving are left accepting our graciousness along with its limits. What can we do other than to grieve with them, offer a hug, and express gratitude for the life of their loved one?

The question of how to comfort people in the face of death haunted me as a seminarian but now, I would take five funerals over one wedding because of today's celebration. Today, we celebrate the greatest miracle that has ever occurred for humanity. Jesus Christ, the Son of God, truly, bodily rose from the dead. We now have hope in the face of death, where otherwise there would have been nothing but pagan despair. We do grieve in the face of death, even Christ wept at Lazarus' grave, but we mourn with hope and confidence because just as Jesus rose from the dead, we are promised the same.

"Where O death is your victory, where O death is your sting?" (1 Cor. 15:55).

It is common in older Christian cultures to say to each other in the Easter season "The Lord is risen" with the response "He is risen indeed". As intentional disciples of Christ, we have more to offer people in the face of death than food and condolences, as kind but also impotent a gesture that is. We have this unshakable truth of faith that makes our life as short timers on this earth more than bearable, an adventure that makes it exciting and free.

The Lord's resurrection means that in the end, nothing bad can happen to us if we stay with Him and encourage others to do the same.

Pope Francis has reminded us in this Jubilee Year that we are Pilgrims of Hope:

"The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope."

Do we live as people with hope?

This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

For more than a thousand years, the Church has sung five words that capture the message of Easter: Christ our hope has risen.

This simple phrase powerfully expresses the conviction that our hope is the very person of the Risen Christ. He not only rose from the dead two-thousand years ago but is present and active in our world today. As the Risen One, he shares with us his victory and triumph over sin and death, drawing us into the fullness of life that God has ever desired for humanity. Yes, indeed Christ our hope has risen.

GOSPEL MEDITATION - April 20, 2025 - Easter Sunday - John 20: 1-9

When I was a young boy, my parents told me about their wedding. Then a few years later, they showed me my mother's wedding dress and my dad's suit. It was astonishing to see and touch garments that connected me to the event that led to my existence. Of course, I already believed they were married based on their word. But these holy garments made the event real and tangible for me.

Something like this is at play when St. John reports encountering in Jesus' tomb, "the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place" (John 20:7). Those two separate cloths, for his head and for his body respectively, meant a great deal to St. John and to the early Christians. Some years after the resurrection, there surfaced reports of two cloths with unusual characteristics, one bearing the image of a crucified man's body, another smaller one with the image of a wounded man's face. Some call them the Shroud of Turin and the Veil of Manoppello; they both can be seen today.



These two cloths have a long and complicated history, and scholars debate aspects of them. If you're curious, I encourage you to read about them. To be clear, I believe in the resurrection of Jesus because of the testimony of eyewitnesses and the

gift of faith in the Church. Nevertheless, seeing these two mysterious cloths have made the life-giving event of Jesus' resurrection more real and tangible for me. Maybe they will for you, too.


